The returning officer made his official tabulation of the results Tuesday of last week. Prior to that, they were "unofficial" returns from the deputy returning officers. In one of Halton's closest elections, Snow ended up with 9,867 votes, Skuce had 9,703 and N.D.P. candidate William D. Gillies of Oakville had 6,359.

On election night, Snow led by 160 votes, then errors reduced the figure to 104. The service vote which came in a week later gave Snow eight votes and Skuce five.

Skuce had considered a recount but decided to give it up. There were only 129 spoiled ballots — not enough to give him a victory even if all of them had turned out to be valid ballots in his favor.

"It was quite an exciting first try," Skuce said. He hopes to be back in the next provincial election race.
