Anglicans, Uniteds working towards inter-communion

munion between members of the Anglican and United churches has moved a step closer. The subject was one of the major items on the agenda of the General Commission on Union between the two churches which met at Bolton in December.

While some Anglicans and United Church congregations have been participating in each other's communion services, official sanction of the Anglican Church has not yet been given. A committee has now been authorized to study the possibility of a covenant which would allow for inter-communion.

The General Commission on Union, comprising 20 members from each denomination, met at

In addition to the 40 General shortly. Commission members, cochairmen from the special commissions of doctrine, liturgy, constitution, legal matters and the church in the world participated in the discussions.

The General Commission executive, made up of clergy and lay representatives from both denominations, was asked to prepare for the next meeting guide lines for parish clergy for experimentation at the local level. This would include such subjects as a joint Anglican-United Church ministry, co-operative planning and joint use of resources.

was named at the meeting. He is Rev. Canon Ralph R. Latimer, general secretary of the Anglican Church of Canada, who will assume full duties of the new position June 1, 1968. Target dates for the completion of reports of the five special commissions were also agreed

The commissions on doctrine, liturgy and the church in the world are to complete their reports by at least December, 1968. The constitutional commission will report by at least June, 1969 and the legal commission by December, 1969.

The final document, prepared by the general commission, detailing how union is to be consumated, is to be ready for presentation to the two churches by June, 1972. It will be submitted for approval to the highest church

The following is a year-end report on Agriculture in Halton County during 1967, prepared for this newspaper by Henry J. Stanley, Agricultural Representative.

Our Centennial Year certainly cannot be classed as a normal year for agriculture.

Rainfall was considerably above normal in June, resulting in delayed haying and slow germination and growth of the spring grains and corn. The hay yield was considerably above average. but quality was poor because of the rain. As a result, cows are forage this winter and not producing as much milk from it.
