Merchants sweep pair from Lindsay climb towards league leadership

Somebody should have told the Milton Merchants that those chaps from Lindsay they beat twice in a back to back weekend series are currently the league leaders in the Suburban Junior C loop.

The Merchants, who have a reputation for putting out only what they have to, had little trouble dealing with the league-leading Lindsay team as they beat them 4-1 here Friday and 8-6 at Lindsay Monday.

Lindsay, still in first place and one point in front of Georgetown and three in front of the locals, never saw the lead in either game.

Milton scored their first two goals on power plays and held a 2-0 lead going into the final period here Friday. Teddy Hood opened the scoring on a shot from well out with Roger Wildfong and Graham Hern assisting. Hern scored the second goal on a power play, again from Wildfong and Hood. Hern's goal came after concentrated pressure on the Lindsay net and a series of near misses.

Ricky Cole went off alone for fighting in the second period when he attacked a Lindsay player. The victim chose not to fight but rather to put both gloves over his head and hope for speedy service from the officials.

Lindsay closed the gap to 2-1 before Craig Brush scored number three on a really pretty shot from the left wing. Brush caught the right hand corner on a slap shot.

Teddy Hood scored his second goal of the game to conclude the scoring. Hern assisted on Hood's goal.

Footnotes: Coach Eddy Swiss' comment after the game: "I feel great. The boys were really working out there tonight. They were hitting well, passing and the forwards were coming back and really checking. They beat Lindsay and they deserved to win."

Milton outshot their opponents 32-31 and this was an indication of the close competition. Both goaltenders played exceptionally well as both teams had several scoring opportunities. The game had to rate as probably the best game of the season and the crowd of close to 500 had good reason to be satisfied.
