His Pioneer 3675 corn was sown on 36 rows and at a population of 20,000 plants per acre. Twenty-one Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association members entered this competition. Prize money will be presented at the annual meeting on Wednesday, January 17 in the Masonic Hall, Milton.  
Runners-up were as follows: Norman Smith, R.R. 3, Campbellville, 144.2 bushels per acre; Doug Starrett, R.R. 1, Glen Williams, 136.9; Geo. & L.H. Leaver, R.R. 3, Campbellville, 134.7; H. C. Reid, R.R. 6, Milton, 132.3; George Burkholder, R.R. 2, Burlington, 127.6; Harvey Nurse, R.R. 2, Georgetown, 126.9; Gordon Malmstrom, R.R. 2, Milton, 124.8; Claude Inglis, R.R. 2, Campbellville, 124.7; H. Ruddell, R.R. 2, Georgetown, 123.9; David Lawson, R.R. 5, Milton, 112.9.
