and will be based on 25 mills. A penalty of 1/2 of 1% per month will be charged if the bill is not paid by February 29.


THE BALANCE OF THE PROPERTY TAXES may be paid in full in June, or in three instalments, in JUNE, AUGUST and NOVEMBER.
