Break-down only drawback as Glen Eden Ski Club hosts record attendance

Everything was "go" at Glen Eden over the weekend. What proved to be a record-breaking weekend got off to a bit of a rough start Saturday morning when mechanical difficulties caused a two hour delay for ski lessons.

Manager Ken Potter explained the delay was caused when a careless skier swung the T-bar improperly when getting off and caused the cable to come off at the bull wheel. "It is a minor problem except we had to get a crane to put the main cable back in place.

By noon workmen had everything in order and free passes were issued to those who had to wait. To add to the confusion, there was a mix-up in the bus schedule and many Burlington people were left at their pickup points waiting for a bus to the ski area.

Buses were sent out later and most of the people were given instructions later Saturday afternoon.

Lessons have been extended one more week to make up for any inconvenience caused Saturday.

Although there were no official figures available for the weekend, Potter said Sunday's crowd probably tripled last year's average.

Saturday evening featured skiing, tobogganing, rides on snowmobiles and dancing inside to the sound of the Pale Orchid. Mr. Potter said he hoped to have bands in on different nights and open the area up to make full use of the facilities.
