In defence of Red Sox

On last week's Sports Page, it was stated by a Juvenile spokesman that his team was not treated well by the Senior Red Sox. In reply to that comment, I would like to make these remarks.

In the 1967 season, the Juveniles were sponsored well by the Senior section. At the beginning of the season, entry fees (approx. \$40) for the Juvenile players were paid by the Seniors. As the season progressed, the Senior Red Sox bought about three dozen balls, some bats and helmets - (valued at approx. \$125) for the Juvenile team. Along with this, the Seniors gave their old uniforms (in good condition) to the needy Juveniles after acquiring new ones donated by the town merchants.

During the season, umpires for each Juvenile home game were paid by the Senior club, (approx. \$50). Before the season was over, the Milton Red Sox sold tickets for three draws in town, trying to keep up with the bills for sponsoring two teams. Involved in the selling of tickets were only a small minority of Juvenile players. During a whole season, not one Juvenile player approached me with a suggestion for raising money for our ball club. To date, the Senior Red Sox are in debt approximately \$150., partially because of the Juveniles. How can they honestly say we didn't treat them well?

Referring to the "vow" made by seven different Juveniles that they would rather play for Campbellville next season, I feel they are taking too much for granted. Would Campbellville want this selfish group of boys?
