## Police year-end statistics indicate 1967 was busy year

Presently consisting of a chief, a sergeant, five constables, two radio-equipped patrol cars and radar equipment, Milton Police Force has affectively supervised Milton since 1960.

Evidence of the town's appreciable growth since then is given by records kept by the police department.

The total amount of fines and court costs assessed, for example, has risen from \$2,251 in 1960 to \$21,433,95 in 1966 and \$20,019 in 1967.

Exactly 11,782 contacts with the public including warnings, serving of summons, questioning, investigation of vehicles and spot checks were recorded during 1967, comparing favorably with 9,879 the previous year and 1,123 in 1960.

Although records on miscellaneous items have not been separated before this year, the force during 1967 attended to 12 escorts, 34 electric alarms, 126 family complaints, nine neighbor disputes, 17 requests for general information, 114 overtime parking checks, and 662 other miscellaneous items. They assisted the public in 95 separate instances, and helped other police departments 239 times.

Three taxi cabs were given routine checks for insurance, meter accuracy, etc.

There were no murders in Milton during 1967, the last being a non-capital charge in 1965. An attempted murder was investigated the same year.

The force received no rape complaints, but 17 sex offenses other than rape were investigated, with 20 per cent of these being cleared either through court or withdrawal of the charge.

Nine attempted child pickups, two obscene telephone calls, one wounding and 36 assaults (not indecent) were reported. Police cleared up 100 per cent of the assault incidents.

Break-and-entry of 20 shops, three houses, and one school was investigated, with 45 per cent of the incidents cleared. Fifty per cent of the 28 auto thefts reported were also cleared. Auto thefts last

year totalled six, comparing to 10 in 1960. Incidents involving thefts over \$50 totalled 20, with a 36 per cent clearance record; and thefts under \$50 totalled 94, with a 31 per cent clearance.

One hundred per cent of the stolen goods cases investigated were cleaned up, and 74 per cent of the 24 frauds.
