Newmarket Fords set precedent capture tournament

Milton Trafalgar Fords got off to a flying start Saturday in Newmarket and never let up until after they had captured the Newmarket Novice Hockey Tournament.

The Ford's whopped Lindsay 8-2 in the first game, then beat Orillia 4-1 and Georgetown 3-1. The Lindsay victory was the big one as they were the team that beat Milton last year. This was the first Milton Novice team to win the tournament.

"The boys won the praise of many fans there with their patterned plays and fast skating" manager Dawson Ellison said. Bruce Ellison scored the first goal of the game and the only goal of the first period to give the Fords a 1-0 lead going into the second period.

John Roskam scored twice in the second period and Paul Sproat scored once giving Milton a 4-1 second period lead over Lindsay. Lindsay scored once in the second and once in the third period. Brad Smith, Rod Gooding, Paul Sproat and Dave Turner (2) were the assistants.

Ellison, Roskam, Sproat and Brent Murray all scored third period goals to conclude the scoring and provide win number one.

Bruce Ellison paced Milton to their second win over Orillia with a three goal effort. Roskam scored one goal while assists went to Steve McCutcheon and Sproat. Orillia scored the first goal of the game but held the lead briefly.

Sproat, Roskam and Gooding were the Milton marksmen in the championship game against Georgetown. All of the scoring was done in the first period.

Expropriate properties on Mary St. Railway tapes 52,000 cars

Preparation of an expropriation by-law was authorized Monday by Milton Council, covering two Mary St. properties required in the proposed realignment of the street.

Offers on the Chambers, Galloway and Heslop properties had been submitted based on four times the current assessed value, the meeting was told. The Heslop offer had been accepted but the other two had been signed back at much higher figures.

"Acceptance at a higher price could establish an inflated value for future property acquisitions in the area", Mayor Brian Best reported.

It was pointed out the town had spent considerable money on having all Mary St. properties appraised, and it was suggested these figures with an additional 10 per cent had still not been acceptable.

The by-law was to be prepared for expropriation at the originally appraised value.

Engineers R. V. Anderson and Associates were instructed to prepare plans and cost estimates for the re-alignment of Mary St. together with plans for a storm sewer running east to the creek with the necessary catch basins and outfall.

Two hit-and-run accidents were reported to Milton Police Department during the past week. The first occurred Tuesday, January 30, when a car owned by Joseph Beaudet of Third Side-road, Milton Heights, received \$30 damage in the parking lot of the Charles Hotel.

Friday, a vehicle owned by Mrs. Marjorie Powys of R.R. 3 Georgetown received \$40 damage in a hit-and-run accident.

A car driven by William van Zutphen of R.R. 3 Milton received \$400 property damage in a collision with a vehicle driven by Larry DeGraaf of 70 Bronte St. Sunday in the Plaza parking lot, Milton Police report.

Damage to the DeGraaf vehicle was estimated at \$200.
