Esquing Council

Clean, straighten Credit channel to alleviate flooding in Glen

Esquing Council passed a resolution at Monday's meeting to accept responsibility for 45 per cent of the cost of phase one of the Glen Williams channel improvement scheme. Cost of the scheme on the Credit River shared with the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, is not to exceed \$9,750.

At an earlier meeting council objected to some of the estimates the C.V.C.A. had prepared for the work, which authorities hope will reduce flooding in Glen Williams. Council felt costs could be kept down by hiring equipment from the area.

Deputy-reeve Tom Hill reporting back from a meeting with C.V.C.A. officials said they were ready to start on the scheme. They waited only on a resolution to say Esquing accepted 45 per cent of the cost.

They explained some estimates were on the high side but rented

equipment could lower prices resulting in savings. The deputy-reeve emphasized C.V.C.A. authorities felt it would be foolish not to do the two jobs of channel improvement at the same time both from an economic and flood prevention standpoint.

They proposed to clean up the river at the trouble point and slice a piece off an island to straighten the channel.

"I was over in the Glen Sunday," said the reeve, "and the people there think if the trouble was cleared up downstream it would be a good part of the cure."

"Mr. White said taking part off the island where it juts out would give the stream a better flow," said Mr. Hill. He outlined how this could help the situation at that point, a trouble spot in the Glen for many years.

Assured by the deputy-reeve work would start immediately,

council passed the needed resolution.

Water problems were also responsible for bringing Jim Ledger and Clarence Denny of R. R. 2, Acton, to council to request a culvert and catch basin be installed in front of their property at Churchill. Mr. Ledger said the water build up was bringing water into his cellar.

Cause was partially due to the Acton reservoir being built beside his home on Churchill. The excess water was not caused by the town since the area flooded before the reservoir was built. He felt conditions could undermine the road eventually.

Deputy-reeve Hill recalled looking at the area before with the engineer and recommending a culvert be installed. The road superintendent, a late arrival, was to be asked to carry out the recommendation.

The proprietor of Al's Meat

Market will be asked to attend the next meeting of council to explain how he intends to run a proposed slaughterhouse behind his store on the seventh line. Council felt the Health Unit had control of these situations but clerk K. C. Lindsay said the township had the power to stop objectionable industries.

"I'm not in favor of a slaughterhouse in the township, particularly not there," declared Councillor Patterson but agreed the request should have a hearing after definitions of the various types of slaughtering were discussed.

Correspondence from the Dept. of Highways revealed responsibility for clearing sidewalks in Norval rested with the municipality. However, there is a 50 per cent subsidy on the work.

It was agreed the cost could go to the road expenses.

A letter from M.P.P. Jim Snow outlined plans for an Air Pollution Control office in Oakville to open this year. Responsibility for air pollution control in Peel and Halton would evolve from there in co-operation with the Department of Health.

Councillor Patterson opposed an item on the agenda which proposed council go into "Committee of the Whole" which automatically excludes the press, for a discussion with the architect for the township offices.

"I'll go along with Pat," said the deputy-reeve. The reeve also agreed it was part of township business.

The architect appeared to discuss responsibility for structural damage to the township office building which he felt reflected on his work. He felt the onus lay elsewhere and laid his case before council to consider.

The deputy reeve and possibly the reeve will accompany the architect on a fact-finding tour some Saturday this month to see the evidence Mr. Halford has collected.

Council recently budgetted \$5,000 for repairs to the township offices.

Since Esquing is allowed four members on the Hornby Parks Board, Charles Austin was appointed to join three other township representatives named previously. Three Oakville representatives are also on the board.
