## Nervous animals Elk dies of broken neck

A veterinarian's report on one of Halton Region Conservation Authority's dead Elk has borne out the earlier theory -- the animal probably ran into a tree and broke its neck while running from children who were seen bothering the animals in the enclosure near Rattlesnake Point Park.

Campbellville vet Dr. Cliff Young did a post mortem on the female Elk and suggested in his report it broke its neck and subsequently died of pneumonia from exposure. The report was read to Thursday's meeting of the Authority executive committee.

"The Department of Agriculture says we have to vaccinate the elk for TB and brucellosis," Field Officer Dave Murray told the executive, "but we are very reluctant to do this. The Elk are very nervous animals, if they get too excited they just drop dead."

The Authority got five Elk from an Alberta game preserve in December, but two died during their first two weeks here. Two of the remaining three are females, and due to calf in the spring. Mr. Murray suggested the Authority should wait until calving time to vaccinate the Elk--any extra commotion might bring about the demise of more of the nervous animals, he indicated.

Besides, the Elk were vaccinated before they left Alberta and were quarantined for six weeks before the train trip to Ontario.

## Fish and Game News

When the first colonists came to America, they huddled in their very primitive huts and log cabins along the coast and found a very bleak winter indeed. They looked out upon the great forests that stretched for hundreds of miles in each direction. Out of this vast wilderness came their food for many a year.

Except for the small clearings that grew Indian corn and a few bushels of wheat, their main source of food came from hunting and fishing. Their guides were the Indians with whom they had managed to make friends. The American Indian was an excellent hunter and fisherman; he had to be if he wanted to live. Thus by hunting and fishing the first settlers managed to survive and prosper.

So our first settlers in Canada were first hunters and fishermen. This tradition has been handed down from generation to generation, but not like our ancestors we do not have to hunt and fish to survive. Today we hunt for sport. 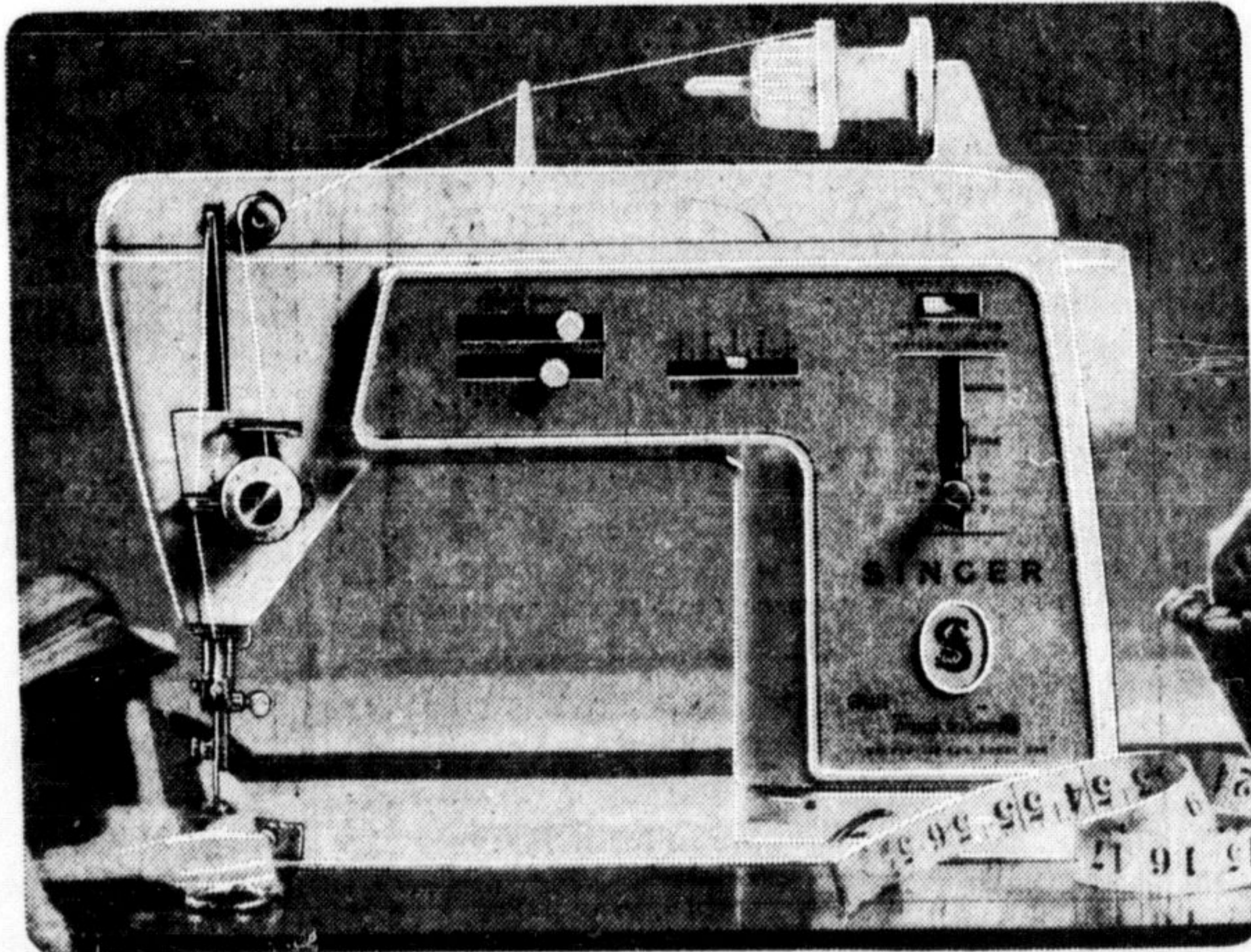

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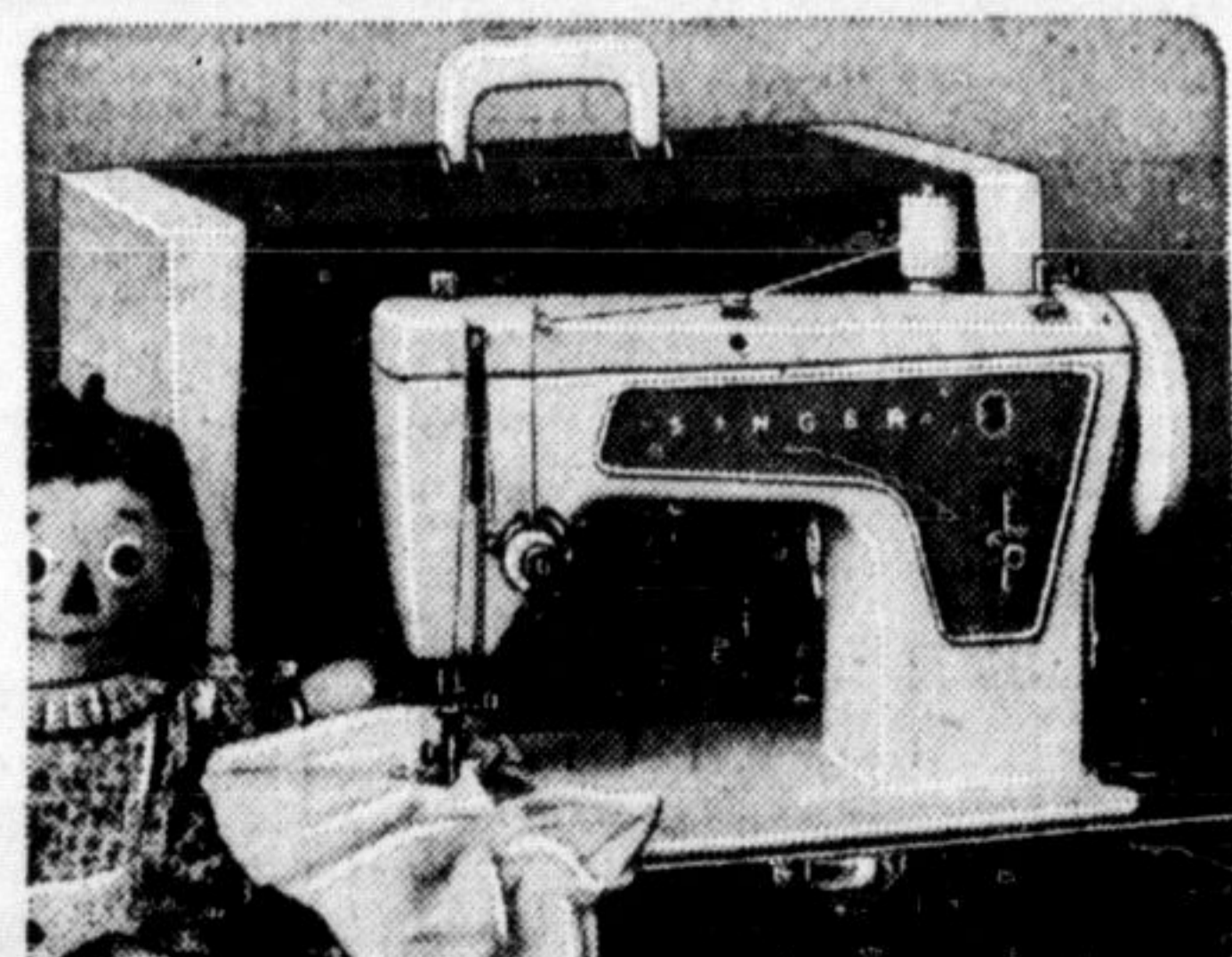
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
