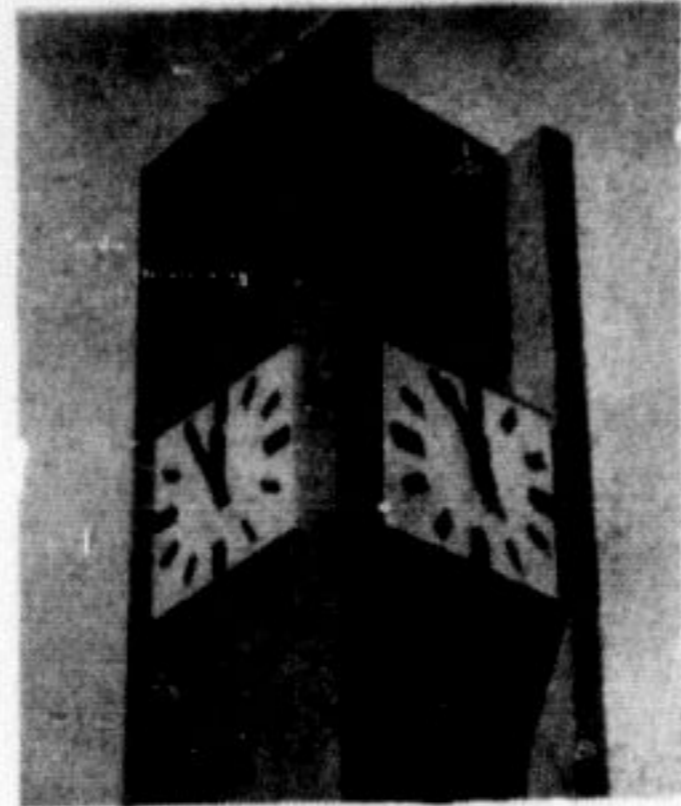
and what you're out to get." "It's up to the individual I say, but personally it wouldn't matter to me. Heck, everybody's doing it."
