



At the May meeting of Nassagaweya Council:

* Members approved the township's share of costs and a 13-year appointment on the new Scotch Block dam in Esquesing Township, as outlined by chairman Barry Humphreys and member Brock Harris of Halton Region Conservation Authority. The township will pay from \$157 to \$231 a year, for a total cost of \$2,581.04 to be collected as part of the \$1.45 per capita levy for conservation. Dr. William Keck of East Lansing, Michigan testified on Milton's groundwater supply. He referred in detail to the testing and aquifer of the well at Kelso. Dr. Keck noted the well there had a capacity of 2,000,000 gallons daily and a probable 4,000 000. Present pumping averages 500,000 gallons daily.

Milton auditor H. A. Lever noted the comparison of mill rates did not allow for the fact Milton's debentures were all sold while Oakville had \$3.000.000 not issued. An allowance for this brought the rates closer, he suggested. He also noted Milton's general rate did not increase this

year but Oakville's had increased approximately four mills.
