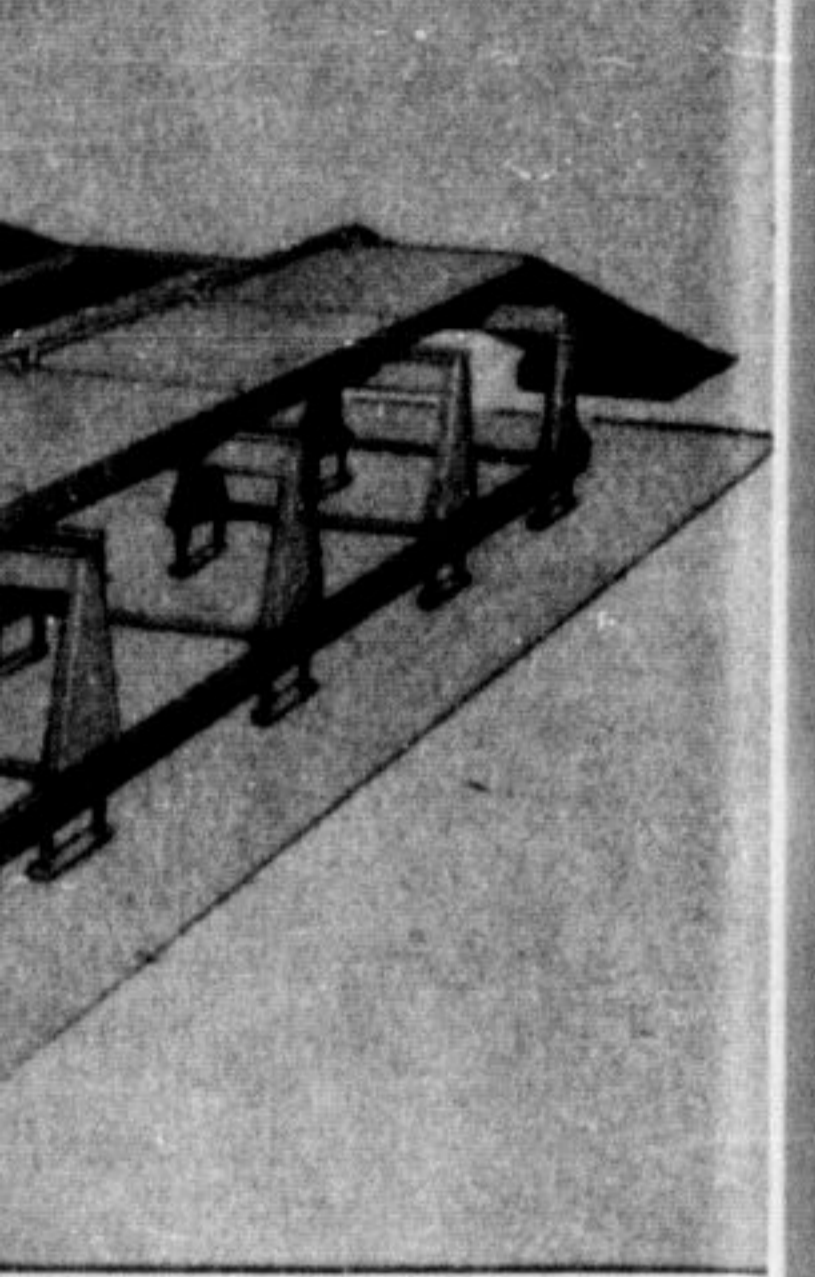

## Nassagaweya Council Briefs

At the May meeting of Nassagaweya Council:

- \* Members approved the township's share of costs and a 13-year appointment on the new Scotch Block dam in Esqueving Township, as outlined by chairman Barry Humphreys and member Brock Harris of Halton Region Conservation Authority. The township will pay from \$157 to \$231 a year, for a total cost of \$2,581.04 to be collected as part of the \$1.45 per capita levy for conservation. The dam is to cost \$600,000 and tenders may be called this summer.
- \* Three councillors planned to attend the annual dinner meeting of the Central Ontario Regional Development Council. The council recently renewed membership in CORDC and Deputy-Reeve W. Hoey and Councillor Mrs. A. MacArthur are delegates.
- \* William Frank was engaged as a laborer with the roads department.
- \* A garage permit issued Mrs. L. Smith was revoked, following earlier complaints from neighbors about an unsightly lot. Council agreed, however, Mrs. Smith was eligible for a building permit for a house.

### Strike ends

Striking laborers at the Milton District High School addition project returned to work Tuesday of last week, after their sixty-day strike slowed down progress and the workers were given a 60 cent an hour increase in pay.

Work is back on schedule now, Steward-Hinan Corp. superintendent Cole Borbas reported this week. The job had been ahead of schedule in many areas anyway, he said. With rainy days taken into consideration, the superintendent felt only three or four days of production were lost.

Dr. William Keck of East Lansing, Michigan testified on Milton's groundwater supply. He referred in detail to the testing and aquifer of the well at Kelso. Dr. Keck noted the well there had a capacity of 2,000,000 gallons daily and a probable 4,000,000. Present pumping averages 500,000 gallons daily.

Milton auditor H. A. Lever noted the comparison of mill rates did not allow for the fact Milton's debentures were all sold while Oakville had \$3,000,000 not issued. An allowance for this brought the rates closer, he suggested. He also noted Milton's general rate did not increase this

year but Oakville's had increased approximately four mills. The hearing adjourned until Wednesday at 10 a.m. Mr. McConachie indicated he had three witnesses to call before concluding his case.

## Mutual Aid network at Georgetown blaze

Six firefighters from Milton Fire Department were called to Georgetown Friday evening to assist the Georgetown brigade with the year's biggest fire.

The blaze destroyed a large mushroom house at Meadowglen Growers at the north-east end of Georgetown. Unable to contain the blaze and protect nearby buildings, Georgetown Fire Chief Erwin Lewis put in a Halton Mutual Aid call for assistance

from Milton, Acton and Oakville fire departments.

The Milton firefighters spent four hours patrolling the fire area and protecting neighboring buildings from the leaping flames and sparks.

It was the first Mutual Aid call involving the Milton brigade since the February, 1963 fire here that gutted the Robin Hood Flour Mill's main mill building. At that fire, Chief A. E. Clement called for help from Acton, Georgetown and Oakville fire brigades.
