One hundred and thirty five can be accommodated in classes and of this number, about 80 live in residence. It is assumed that most adults can achieve grade 7 in 12 weeks and grade eight in the same length of time.

Gerry Wright is the director in charge of the Ontario Manpower Academic up grading courses. Robert Sterling, English teacher stressed that the atmosphere has to be of adult qualities to hold the students, for example, smoking is allowed. Local citizens pay two dollars a week to attend classes. All taking the course are striving to gain more education to secure better positions. One man was trying for grade 10 so he could be an oil burner service man, another to be a certified electrician. There are no age limits for the classes and most are in the 20 to 30 year group. In addition the centre has numerous and well planned short term classes and two or three day seminars.
