Principal, custodian honored by parents

Al Argent, Superintendent of Programs and Robert Sones, Recreation Supervisor for area two of the Recreation Department for the town of Burlington, addressed the members of the Kilbride Home and School Association last Tuesday evening. Mr. Sones made reference to the new plan where the town will be divided into three designated recreation areas and assured all that plans are underway regarding further development of local recreation facilities. He also commended Kilbride for their fine community spirit. Mr. Argent and Mr. Sones were introduced by Gordon Harris and thanked by Dr. R. Muirhead.

President Mrs. Mary Rasberry called on Mrs. Wilbert Ford and presented her with a silver cream and sugar set, then called in Principal James Morrison and presented him with a desk set and a book on Karsh Photography. On behalf of the Kilbride Home and School Association, Mrs. Rasberry expressed thanks and appreciation for their interest and faithful service.

Mrs. Ford has been caretaker of the Kilbride school since the opening in September 1960 and prior to this was in charge of the two room school for eight years.

Mr. Morrison is being promoted and transferred to be principal of the Mohawk Elementary School on Spruce Avenue in Burlington. The school will open in September 1968 with anticipated enrolment of 350 and a staff of 14. The school will be enlarged in 1969 to accommodate 600 pupils. An open concept school design is to be used, (i.e. there are no interior walls - consequently it appears to be one teaching unit). The school is constructed in pods and gives the appearance of being completely round. The focal point of the school is an extensively equipped library resource centre. The curriculum for kindergarten, year one and year two students is designed on an ungraded approach. Consequently the student will progress as rapidly as his mastery of skills allows.

Team teaching is to be used in an attempt to utilize the staff resources more effectively.

To facilitate flexibility of grouping and reduce the noise factor which results from the anticipated movement, the school is equipped with an acoustic ceiling and broadloom throughout. It should be noted that studies show the use of broadloom has proven to be both purposeful and practical.

Mr. Morrison introduced the new principal, Norman Howell. Mr. Howell received his elementary education in Hamilton. He graduated from Westdale Collegiate in 1952 and received his Bachelor of Arts degree from McMaster University in 1964.

Mr. Howell's 13 years teaching experience includes vice-principalships at Mountain Gardens, Rolling Meadows and Elizabeth Gardens. For the past three years Mr. Howell has been principal of Glenwood Public School. Mr. Howell is married and has three children.

Mrs. Jim Johnson conducted the installation of officers for

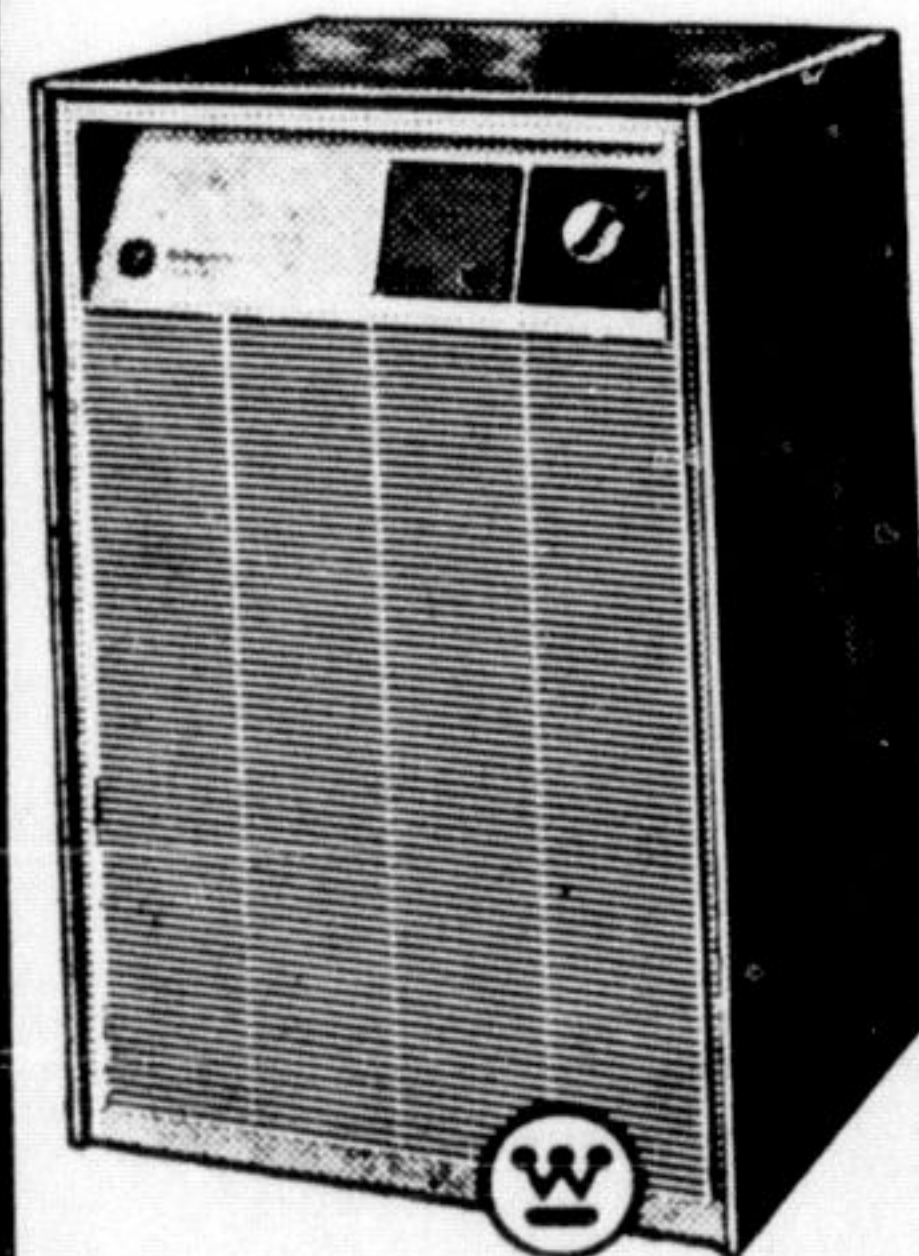


QUEEN'S GRAD


