

Nine street lights for Moffat village

It's going to be a little brighter in the village of Moffat soon, due to a motion passed by Nassagaweya Township Council at their June meeting Monday evening.

The Ontario Hydro Electric Commission will begin installing nine lamp standards at a total estimated cost of \$1,486 as soon as their schedule permits.

Following reading of the Ontario Municipal Board's decision on the township's zoning by-law, council authorized Project Planning Associates to implement minor changes suggested by the O.M.B.

Council has been informed, through complaints of ratepayers of the establishment of an automobile wrecking yard within the hamlet of Moffat.

Although no license for such an operation has been applied for and the zoning of the area allows for only the sale and servicing of new and used cars, nearly two dozen vehicles have been brought to the village and the owner of them has begun advertising his business intentions.

Township zoning administrator S. W. Savage has sent a letter to the proprietor notifying him of his infractions on Nassagaweya's zoning by-law.

A by-law will be read shortly calling for a change in the township's capital charge for land separations.

At present, a flat rate of \$300 per separation is charged, but the high volume of requested separations has forced council to change the rating to \$500 for a residence, \$300 per unit for a duplex and \$200 per unit for apartments.

Road superintendent Grant McMillan reported work proceeding satisfactorily on repairs to the Town Line in the Milton Heights area, and an abandoned basement in the Heights will be filled in to prevent injury to passersby.

The basement is on land the council is considering appropriating due to the large tax bill owing on it.

Toronto resident Mario Giocomini appeared at the meeting to ask reversal of the decision to have him remove a large building from North Nassagaweya property.

Described by Mr. Giocomini as a tool shed and temporary weather shelter for he, his wife and family when they visit the 10-acre garden property, the building contravenes the regulation calling for a limit to all construction except homes with at least 2,000 sq. ft. floor space.

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Milton Council Briefs

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* Appointed Mrs. Olive Nye to fill the Milton Public Library Board to fill a recent resignation.

* Approved preparation of a by-law increasing the fee for dog licenses, effective January, 1969. License for a female will be \$10, for a spayed female or male \$5.

* Authorized Milton Hydro to install two additional lights on the Hugh St.-Mary St. parking lot.

* Accepted the resignation of Constable Russ Connor and approved the hiring of David Langdon from Calgary, a five year veteran of police work for the local Calgary police department.

* Acknowledged the improved lighting evident on Ontario St. south since completion of the project there. When telephone lines are moved the old standards will be removed, Mayor B. Best reported.

* Agreed to wait a week for a report on an earlier request for compliance with a Committee of Adjustment decision regarding a clean-up of a Mill St. property.

* Agreed to grant E. B. Clements a connection to the town storm sewer from property on Mill St. at a cost based on actual time and material used by the town for the work.

* Notified Roy Currie, Wakefield Rd., the town would move the fire hydrant located at his driveway if he was willing to bear the expense.

* Heard Councillor P. Barr report tax arrears were improving with a total of \$39,000 outstanding, most of which was from 1967.

* Named July 2 as a date on which scrolls would be presented to a number of citizens who have served on community boards and retired.

* Learned the recently-purchased front end loader and backhoe had arrived.

* Learned the police chief was investigating the regulation involved in changing the color of the walk signal at the traffic lights from green to white.

* Decided to discuss the summer schedule of meetings next week and to also appraise the success of the present combination of committee and council meetings on alternate weeks.

* Heard a brief report from Councillor C. Fay on his attendance at the Ontario Fire Chiefs' convention and a waterworks convention.

* Granted permission for the Milton Minor Baseball Association to hold its annual chocolate bar sale.

* Authorized any member able to attend the convention of the Ontario Municipal Association. The reeve and deputy-reeve indicated they would be attending on behalf of the county.

* Directed letters of commendation to Fire Chief A. E. Clement on his year's service as president of the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs and to Solicitor D. A. McConachie for his handling of the Milton annexation application, no matter what the outcome.

Town issue is \$18,745

Building permits with a total value of \$18,745 were issued in Milton during May, according to figures released by the office of the building inspector.

The construction included mostly light additions, renovations, garages, porches, and the like.

This brings the year's total to \$59,545 worth of building, compared to \$183,500 at the same time in 1967.

Saturday, a bicycle ridden by 14-year-old Fred Clubine of 431 Oak St. received \$2 damage when it was in collision with a car driven by Mary Thomson of R.R. 5, Milton.

The incident occurred at the intersection of Main St. and Milling Lane (opposite Charles St.). The boy received cuts and bruises.

Seeks stand for new taxi

Council was asked this week to reconsider its views on construction of a taxi stand on a Main St. property, in a letter from Solicitor David Thompson on behalf of Cliff Miles.

The solicitor reviewed the provisions of the by-law and noted the building was really a telephone booth which would contain a telephone, a table and a few chairs for the convenience of passengers. It would be located back of the lot, part of which is elevated, and will not be visible from Main St. It would also be on skids for ease in movement. Council referred the letter to its solicitor for reply.

Boston Cuts Down

Boston is beginning to buy back liquor licenses in an effort to cut down the number of liquor outlets in the city. So far, 18 licenses have been sold back to the city at \$10,000 each, representing eight package stores and nine on-the-premise drinking spots, according to an article in the Christian Science Monitor.

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Nassagaweya Council Briefs

During the regular June meeting of Nassagaweya Township Council Monday evening at Brookville, council:

* Decided to hold an inspection tour of local quarries in early June.

* Moved opposition to closing of an abandoned road allowance needed to be added to a landowner's holdings because of health regulations, on the grounds the road would have to be reopened if and when sale of several adjoining building lots is completed.

* Requested the Ontario Water Resources Commission to survey water resources in the Campbellville area in preparation for investigation of building a subdivision in the area.

* Entered into an agreement with Acton Fire Area Board similar to those in existence for fire protection of the northern end of the township for several years.

* Heard a report on the annual C.O.R.D.C. meeting from Nassagaweya representative councillor Mrs. Anne MacArthur.

Committee will study adopting builder code suggested by Jim Snow

The Hon. Darcy McKeough, Minister of Municipal Affairs, in a statement to the Legislature Wednesday confirmed that the staff of the Department of Municipal Affairs has been giving serious consideration to the adoption of the National Building Code of Canada as the standard building code for the Province of Ontario.

Mr. McKeough stated the resolution brought to the floor of the Legislature by the member for Halton East, Jim Snow has contributed greatly towards the expediting of this matter. It was Mr. Snow's efforts that have helped to bring this matter closer to the surface.

Mr. McKeough advised that to carry on further with the study, it is his intention to establish a small committee of persons knowledgeable and experienced about the buildings and the building by-laws in the province to examine, report and comment to the Government within six to eight months about Uniform Building Standards. The Committee will receive briefs from all who have an interest in Uniform Building Standards. Its report should provide a base from which to decide the merits of the Uniform Building Standards, the extent to which they should apply and the means whereby such an end may be achieved.

Voters in the north end of Halton riding have two chances to meet the three June 25 election candidates before election day rolls around.

All three — P. C. Peter McWilliams, Liberal Rud Whiting, and New Democrat Murray Kernighan, will be on stage together at Erin Legion Hall on June 6, and again at Acton United Church on June 20.
