It didn't take long for real estate representative David Meal to find out Esquesing Council's reaction to a proposed subdivision within shouting distance of the township's offices.

Councillors outlined the steps the subdivider would have to take to build 60 or 70 homes on the "old Cleave" farm but made it clear they would do nothing to help implement the idea.

Reeve George Currie said the township was not interested in additional subdivisions. Reason? The public school mill rate was up 10 mills this year. More homes meant more children and more schools.

Mr. Meal's proposal was for the 57 acres to be divided into half-acre lots with roads, park and a central water system.
