


One piece of new legislation introduced this week in the Legis the Act entitled the Employment Standards' Act, which will replace several other acts con-

cerning employment. tion into line with working conditions that have wide acceptance in the province. This new act, expected to be effective in the fall, includes all the benefits made available to workers under the present legislation and establishes new provisions calling for time and a half pay for overtime beyond 48 hours a week, equal pay for men and women doing the same work, and seven statutory holidays for which employees would receive time and a half if they work on these days. or for Georgetown District High

The new legislation will also empower the Labour Department to collect unpaid wages for employees up to a total claim of

The Hon. Allan Grossman on May 27 introduced new legislation called the Correctional Services Act. This act consolidates into one 18 existing acts dealing with adult offenders. The major changes are to be made in the complete method of operation of correctional institutions and changes in the whole correctional attitude and system.

The Hon. Darcy McKeough, Minister of Municipal Affairs, announced Wednesday that a committee is being set up immediately to further study the possibility of bringing in the national building code as a standard building code for the Province of Ontario as suggested in my resolution to the floor of the House on March 4 of this year. Thanks to the many people of Milton and district, the Second Milton Scouts collected approximately eight tons of waste paper on Friday, May 31.



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
