Variety of fun events in Conservation Week

July 8 to July 14 has been designated as Conservation Week in Halton. Over 30 community service groups are co-operating with The Halton Region Conservation Authority in organizing a gala week of activities.

The brainwave of Rud Whiting, Oakville representative to the Authority, Conservation Week has been enthusiastically supported by all those approached.

Planned to stimulate public awareness and support of conservation goals in Halton, and to involve the public in dreams for the future, Conservation Week will appeal to all ages.

The following programs have been scheduled:

MONDAY JULY 8 Official Opening of Mountsberg Conservation Area;

Mountsberg Wildlife Preserve, containing the 500 acre reservoir created by the Mountsberg Dam Project, is the Authority's most original wildlife conservation project. A home for 20 varieties of wildfowl, foxes, deer, and other animals; the farm is also experimenting with the winter feeding of wildfowl.

J. C. Thatcher, Deputy Minister of Energy and Resources Management will speak to representatives of all government levels, local landowners, conservationists, and press at the 2 ure plans for Conservation Week p.m. opening. Pheasants shall include this event as an annual be released and fish stocked at and larger contest. Mountsberg Reservoir as the tour of the 1,200 acre area follows. A reception shall be held at Mountsberg Game Farm at 4 p.m. and the public is welcome at the opening.

THURSDAY, JULY 11 Project Preservation

Over 600 children will take part in Project Preservation, planning, directing and carrying out their own small conservation projects. Children from the Oakville, Burlington, Milton Recreation Playgrounds; YMCA, Society and Scouting groups will learn through practical experience and involvement the value of conservation.

Most of these junior conservationists will clear shore lines, construct stream fish wiers, line stream banks etc. in their own local area. Ninety will release pheasants, stock fish and band ducks at Mountsberg Wildlife Preserve, combining this contribution with a picnic day and a visit to meet 'Bashful Bobby the Buffalo Bull' at Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area.

The Halton Region Conservation Authority will present individual participation parchments to the youngsters. A grand award will be given to the group contributing the most original pro-

FRIDAY, JULY 12 Adventure Day at Kelso Dam Conservation Area;

Adventure Day will combine the excitement of an outdoor picnic day with valuable lessons on how to be at home in the wilderness. Children from Oakville. Burlington and Milton recreation programs will receive instruction in Orienteering, tour the escarpment and the Halton Coun-

ty Museum. The Ontario Orienteering Association and Professor Alex Peepre of the Department of Physical Education, University of Guelph, will instruct over 200 boys and girls in Orienteering -- the art of wilderness familiarity with map and com-

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pass. Kelso Pool staff has organized a swim competition in the afternoon. Each group will enter a 12 - member team, rooting on their team to try for the grand award.

Adventure Day will emphasize the close relationship between sport, recreation and conservation to some of the future citizens of Halton.

SATURDAY JULY 13 Sportsman Day at Rattlesnake Point and Kelso Dam

Professor Alex Peepre of the Department of Physical Education, University of Guelph, and the Ontario Orienteering Association will instruct 60 people in "finding your way in the wilderness." Starting at 10 a.m. participants will learn the use of a directional compass, and participate in the popular and easy hiking sport of Orienteering.

The Bruce Trail Association's hiking enthusiasts will lead families on nature hikes throughout the morning from Rattlesnake. At 1 p.m. the afternoon will start with a bang as the Halton

Sportsmen's Club Conservation Week Invitational Trap Shoot begins. Open to all members of Halton trap clubs, eight man teams will compete in a 25 clay bird contest for the trophy. Fut-

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
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
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
