The flower bearers were grandsons Keith Green of Belleville, Richard Barr of Chatham, Doug Barr of Milton, and Bill Joslin of Kingston.

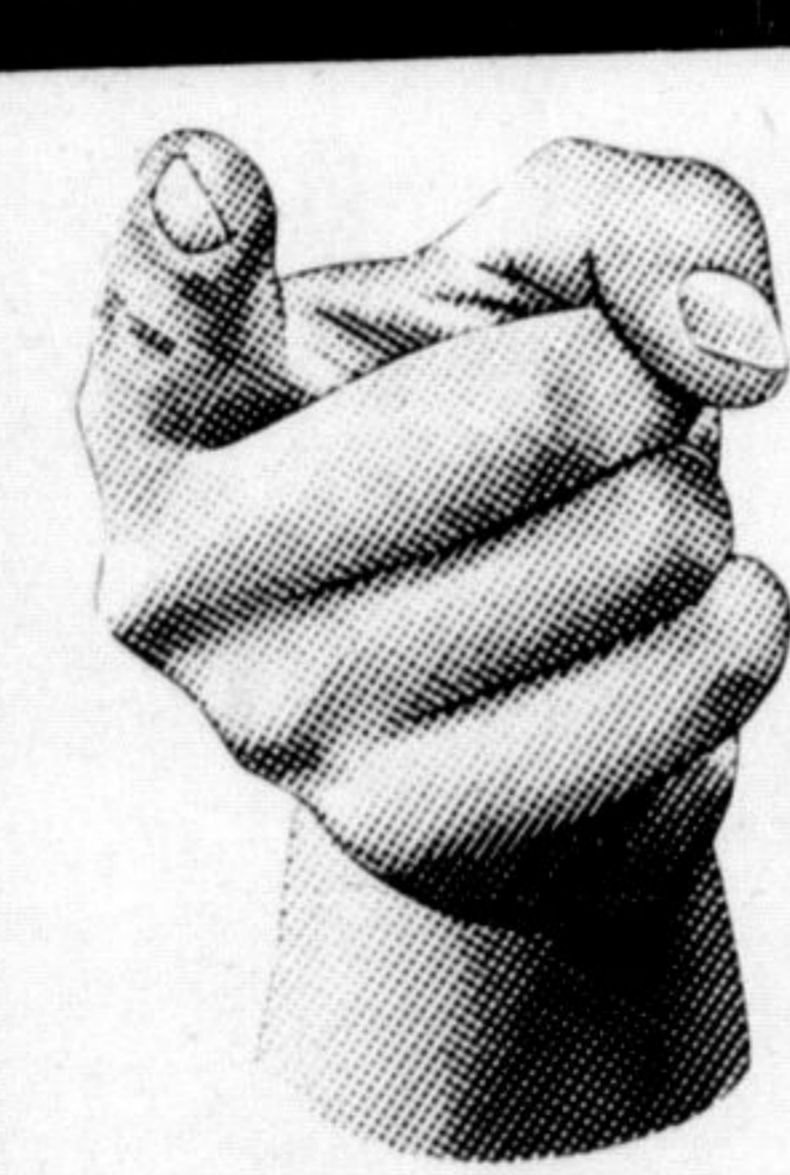
Mrs. Barr was a patient, kind and loving woman to her family and all who knew her.

Co-op men at seminar

Bill Mullin, Halton-Orangeville group manager of United Co-operatives of Ontario and Jim Auger, manager of the Milton branch, attended a sales management seminar for co-operative managers from across Ontario last week. The seminar sponsored by United Co-operatives of Ontario, was held at The Talisman in the Beaver Valley near Kimberley.

The seminar was designed to give managers training on development of sales and service programs to better serve members and patrons of Co-operatives. Topics covered included least cost distribution methods, credit, marketing, employee and public relations and advertising.

Two of these seminars were held, with a total of 100 management people attending from such widely separated communities as Vankleek Hill, east of Ottawa, to Sault Ste. Marie in the north, and Cottam in Essex County in the west.



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
