Halton County Credit Union reports on successful year

Reports on a very encouraging first year of operation were heard by members of the Halton County Employees Credit Union, at the organization's first annual meeting held at the Manor in Milton last week.

The board of directors' first annual report showed the year had been a rewarding one, with \$11,656 in shares and personal loans totalling \$12,325. Directors declared a five per cent dividend on shares and a 10 per cent rebate on loan interest. There are presently over 90 members.

A citation was presented by Board of Directors president S. A. Allen to Garfield Brown, county clerk-administrator, in recognition of his work in founding the credit union.

The 1968 officers were elected, with most officers returning to the same positions for the second year. The board of directors includes Mr. Allen, Robert Beach, Mrs. Eva Hankins, George Duncan and Clare McKay. Credit committee is composed of George Hillson, George Tocher and Mrs. L. Becker, while the supervisory committee includes Jack Corbett, Mr. R. E. Jackson and Mrs. G. Winnie.

65th anniversary as priest celebrated by Manor resident

A service in honor of the 65th anniversary of ordination of Archdeacon R. C. Blagrove, D.D., was held Trinity Sunday, June 9 at Grace Anglican Church.

A resident of Halton Centennial Manor for the past year and a half, Rev. Blagrove was born in Rawdon, Quebec in August of 1879 and he spent his boyhood and early education there before earning a Bachelor of Arts degree at McGill University. He graduated in Theology from the Montreal Diocesan College in 1903.

On Trinity Sunday of the same year he was ordained by the Rt. Reverend W. L. Mills, Bishop of Ontario.

His charges have included the Mission of Coe Hill and the Parish of Rawdon, Ont., and rector of Christ Church at Belleville from 1905 to 1917. While in Belleville he studied for and received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity and then Doctorate of Divinity.

He later moved to St. Mark's, Parkdale and St. John's, Peterborough, St. Thomas' in Hamilton, and was Chaplain of the Hamilton Sanatorium in 1950.

His last charge was St. Jude's in Oakville.

A presentation from Grace People's Warden Robert Argall was made to him Sunday, and the service included lesson readings by Rev. Blagrove's son, Canon C.N.P. Blagrove, rector of St. Jude's in Oakville, and T. Broadbent, registrar of the diocese of Niagara.

The sermon was delivered by Rt. Rev. W. E. Bagnall, Bishop of the Diocese of Niagara.

Safe year

A Highway Safety Award for a fatality free year was presented by Mayor B. Best to Police Chief Ray Andrews during the Monday meeting of Milton Council.

The mayor had received the award at a luncheon earlier that day, and in passing the award along, praised the work of the police in maintaining the safety record. Police Chief Ray Andrews expressed appreciation and a hope for continuing co-operation from the citizens. He noted the town's last fatality was in July 1960, as he "touched wood."

Recommends warning system at Derry Rd. - Hwy. 25 corner

A coroner's jury of five north Oakville residents decided last week Albert Lair of Port Credit and Charles F. Munro of Mississauga died as a result of injuries received when their car was in collision with a fuel oil tanker at the intersection of Derry Rd. (No. 10 Sideroad) and Highway 25 at 3:10 a.m. April 27.

The jury, composed of north Oakville residents Henry J. Al-

len, Peter Mackie, Charles Kennedy, Joseph Shea, and Wilbert Penman, also recommended a more adequate warning system be installed at the intersection. Lair and Munro were presumed to have been on a fishing trip when their eastbound vehicle failed to stop at the intersection and collided with the tanker, which was travelling south on Highway 25.

After demolishing the Port Credit men's car, the tanker careened across the nearby Richardson Chev-Olds Ltd. car lot, striking several used cars and causing \$3,000 damage to them.

An inquest had been called by Halton Crown Attorney Murray Ralston and was conducted on Thursday June 13 in Oakville Municipal Building by Coroner Dr. G. K. Phillips.

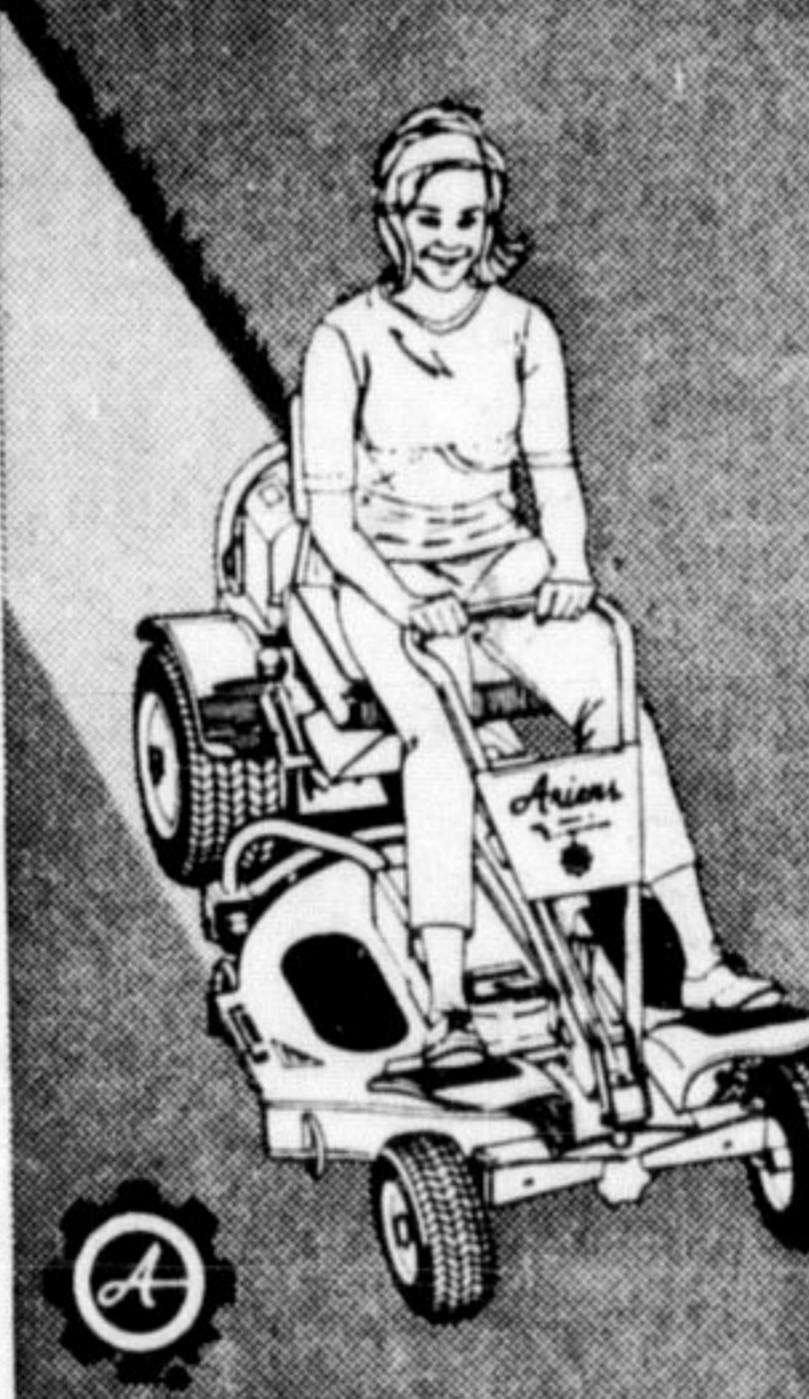
