Large congregations overflowed the capacity of Boston Presbyterian Church morning and evening services on Sunday. A service to mark the 148th anniversary of the congregation and the 100th anniversary of the building was held in the morning and a service celebrating the completion of the recent renovations at night. Both services were held at the stone church on the Third Line Esplanade.

Two oak elders' seats were presented by Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Brown as a memorial to William Hampshire, many years an elder and former superintendent of Boston Church.

A walnut display cabinet was presented by Jack Robertson on behalf of Mrs. Mary Robertson and family in memory of Franklin Robertson, lifetime member of Boston Church.

In the display cabinet were placed two communion cups and a large communion wine decanter all made of pewter and formerly used by the congregation. One communion cup, donated by Mrs. Ward Ruddlell, was used by the first congregation from the year 1824.

The renovations included the reconstruction of the choir area, the installation of a new Hammond organ, carpeting the floor of the

church and redecoration of the interior. The memorial furniture new organ and new pulpit were dedicated, and the renovated sanctuary rededicated during the evening service.

Emmett McGibbon presented the new organ on behalf of the congregation, Robert W. Dredge the new pulpit, and Stanley Wil-

son the renovated sanctuary.

Rev. Ross K. Cameron of York Memorial Church Toronto, was guest preacher at both services. Rev. Byron Nevin, a former minister, dedicated the elders' seats. Rev. B. F. Andrew, a former minister, dedicated the display cabinet. Rev. J. K. L. McGown, Moderator of the Presbytery of

Brampton, presided at the evening service and rededicated the renovated sanctuary. Rev. Stanley E. Smith, the present minister, dedicated the new Hammond organ.

Special music was rendered by the choir under the direction of Mrs. Flora Sloski, organist. Solos were rendered by William Brush, Mrs. Harold Michie, Mrs. Audrey Peddie, and a number was sung by the Male Quartette of Knox Church Milton.

As a Centennial project, the Boston Young Married Group constructed a walk and steps from the parking lot to the church. An enjoyable social hour followed the evening service.

Many people participated in the renovations. Two committees within the congregation and several other individuals not on committees did their fair share in helping out.

The planning committee consisted of convener Rev. S. E. Smith, R. W. Dredge, S. J. Wilson, E. R. Wilson, C. Brown, D. Currie, E. Howden, Mrs. H. Michie and Mrs. W. Schreiber.

The building committee consisted of convener D. Currie, C. C. Brown, D. Robertson, E. Howden, Mrs. E. R. Wilson, Mrs. J. Irving and Rev. Smith.

Donald E. Skinner was the architect in charge of the renovations, Zorge Construction Company of Georgetown had the general contract, Gil Vansoelen did the painting, Syer's Family Fashions of Milton laid the carpet, and the new organ was procured through Hammond Studios in Toronto.

The church carries with it a history going back to March of 1866 when the congregation approved the building of the pre-

sent church. Two years later the foundation stone was laid and in January of 1870 the first service was held in the new church.

The stone for the church came from the Hume Quarry, sand from the farm of Thomas Duff and lumber from James Lindsay's farm.

A furnace was installed in a small basement and stained glass windows were donated as a memorial to Mrs. Margaret Murray. In 1960 a basement hall, a new gas furnace and wash rooms under the sanctuary and a church parlor and class rooms were added to the rear of the church.

In 1967 the Boston Ladies' Aid installed a kitchen in the basement area and finally in 1968 the choir area was reconstructed, the new organ installed, carpet was laid on the floor of the church and the interior was redecorated.
