\* Received word from the C.P.R. saying lights and short arm gates will be installed at the Guelph Junction on the First Line in Nassagaweya. This was the crossing that took the lives of four Campbellville youths last year.

\* Learned the township had the deed for 1,400 square feet of land bought from Mr. and Mrs. John Clark for road widening purposes.

\* Learned St. David's Presbyterian Church was in opposition to a Sunday opening at Mohawk Raceway because it involved working on Sunday and added to the traffic congestion in that area.

\* Learned the Committee of Adjustment had set public meetings dealing with land separations for Mrs. Joan Connel, Mr. and Mrs. M. Dudnick, A. Boers, William Real and Tom Cargill, all on the evening of June 20.

\* Passed a by-law dealing with dog control stating the Oakville Humane Society has the power to

destroy or sell any dog left after 72 hours or return the dog to its owner for \$5 plus \$2 a day; and all injured or diseased dogs would be destroyed at the discretion of the Humane Society but the Society would have to keep a record of how many and what dogs they killed.

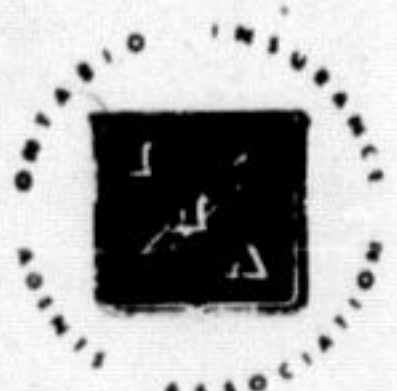
\* Granted \$25 to Halton Plowmen's Association.

## Must stop for buses

Complaints have been received about motorists failing to stop for school buses, Milton O.P.P. reported this week.

As a reminder to all drivers, Section 94 (2) of the Highway Traffic Act states: -

"Where a school bus is stopped on a highway or part of a highway on which the maximum speed is greater than 35 miles per hour for the purpose of receiving or discharging school children, the driver of vehicle,

(a) when overtaking a school bus on which the words "do not pass when signals flashing" are marked and two red signal-lights are illuminated by intermittent flashes; and

(b) when meeting on such a highway, other than a highway with separate roadways, a school bus on the front of which two red signal-lights are illuminated with intermittent flashes, shall stop the vehicle before reaching the school bus and shall not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or the signal-lights are no longer operating."

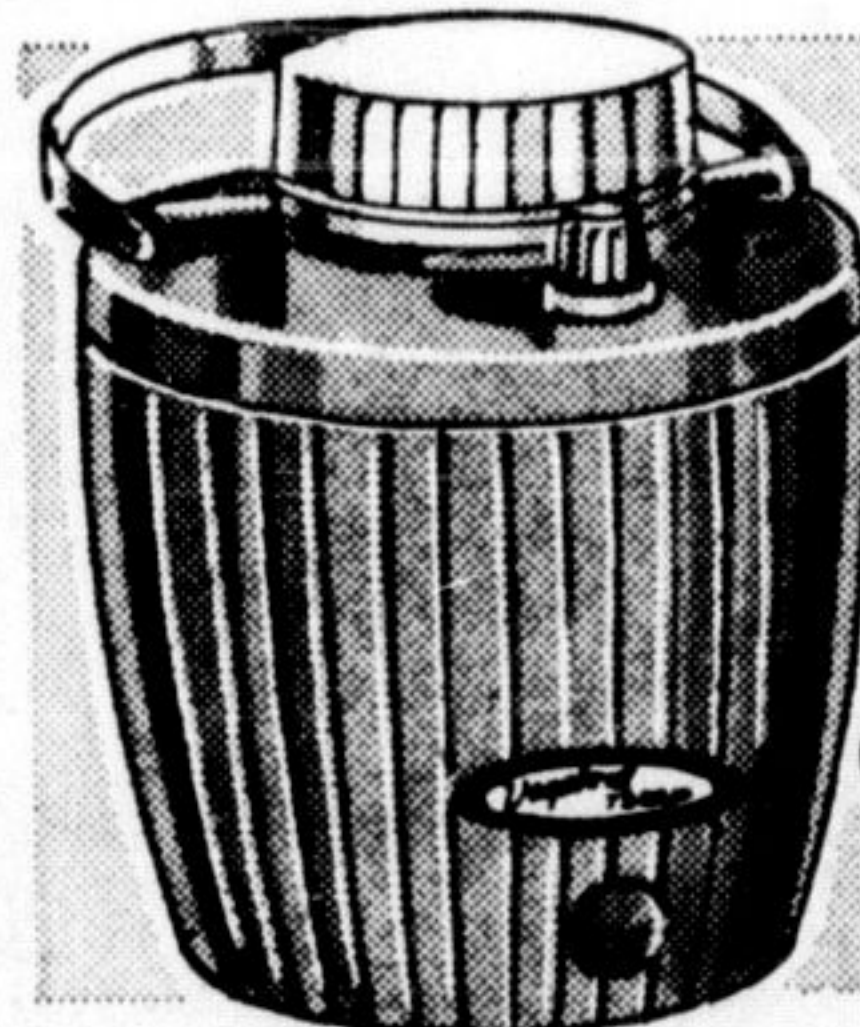
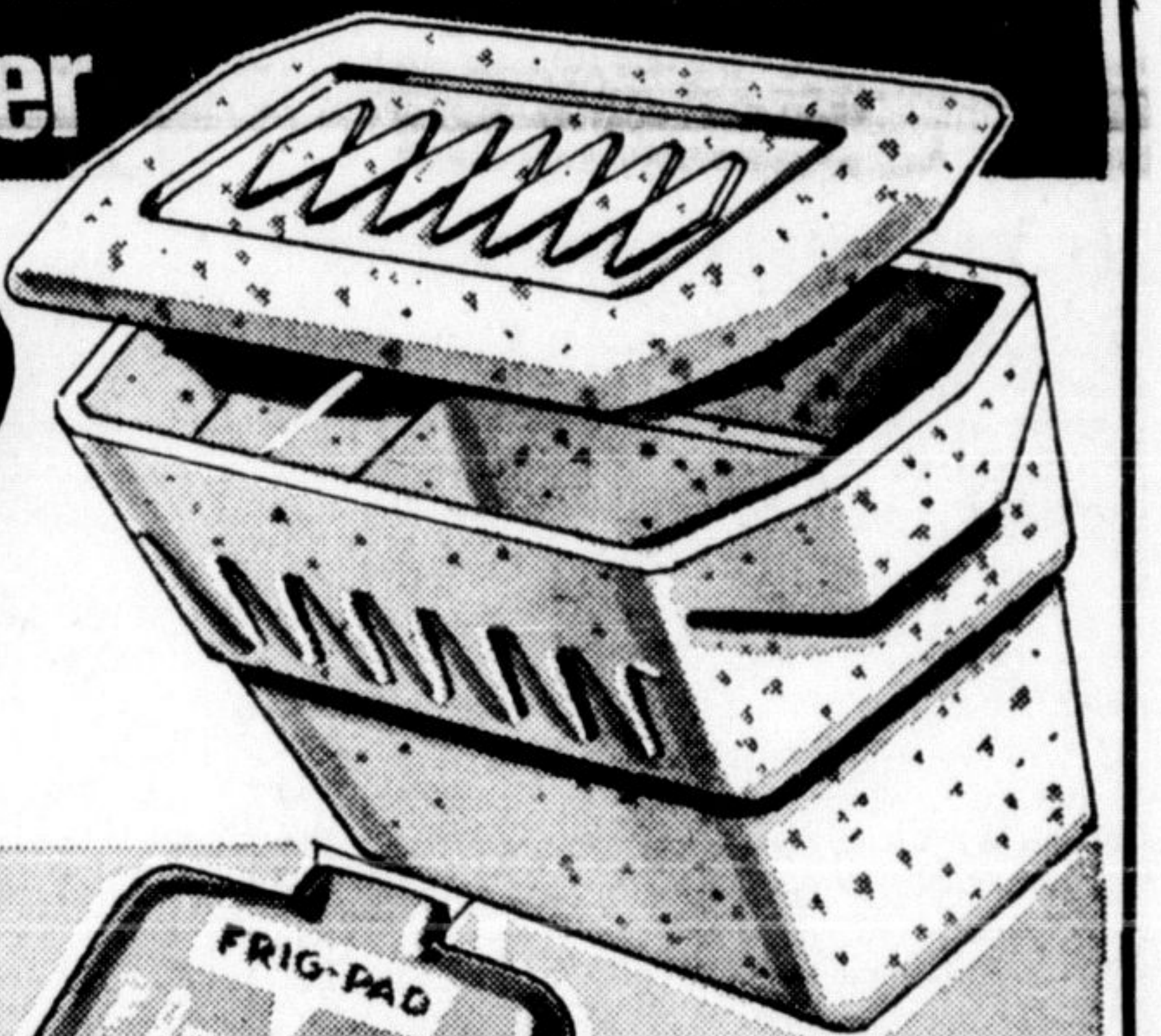

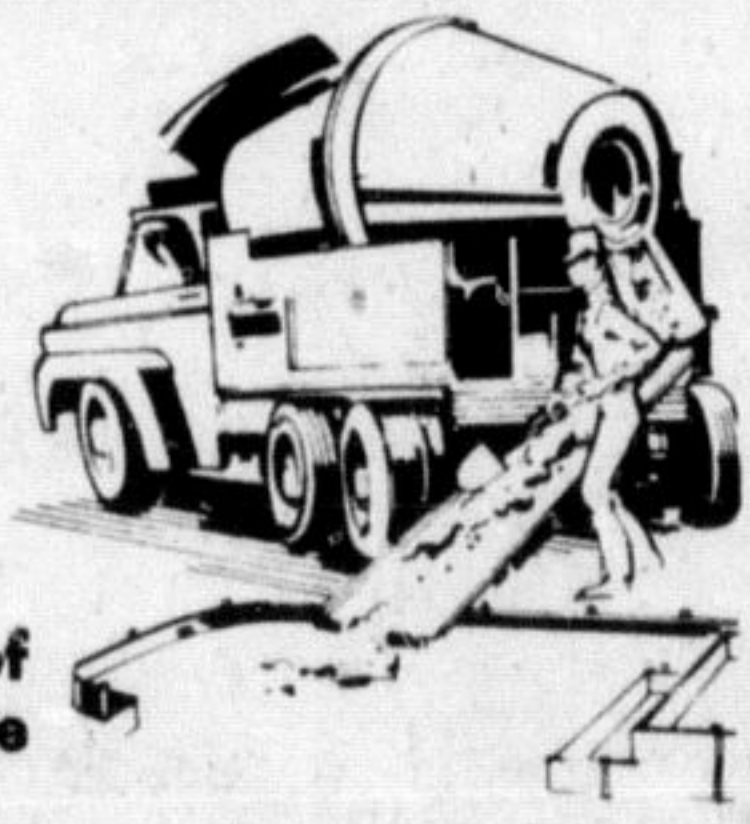
