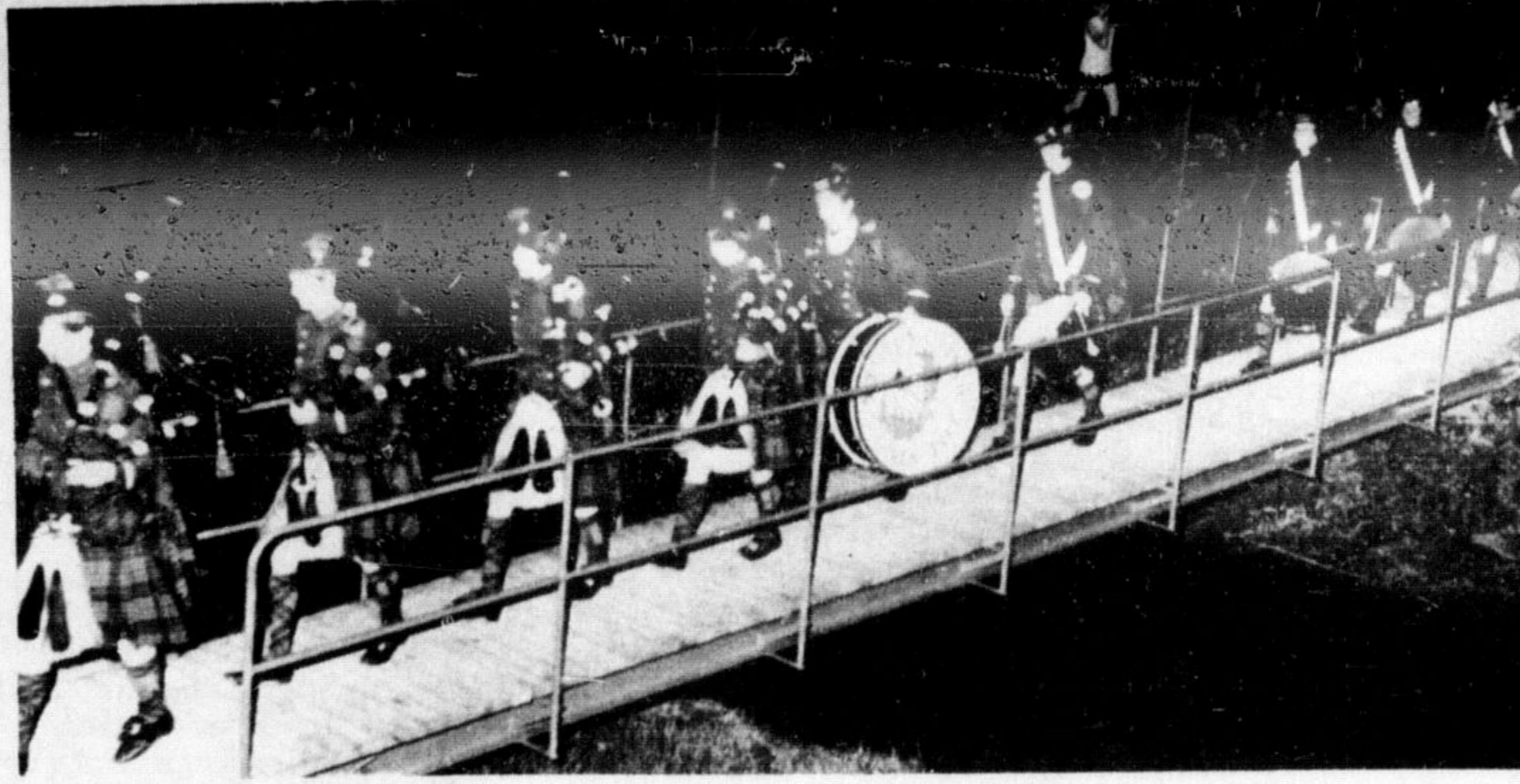

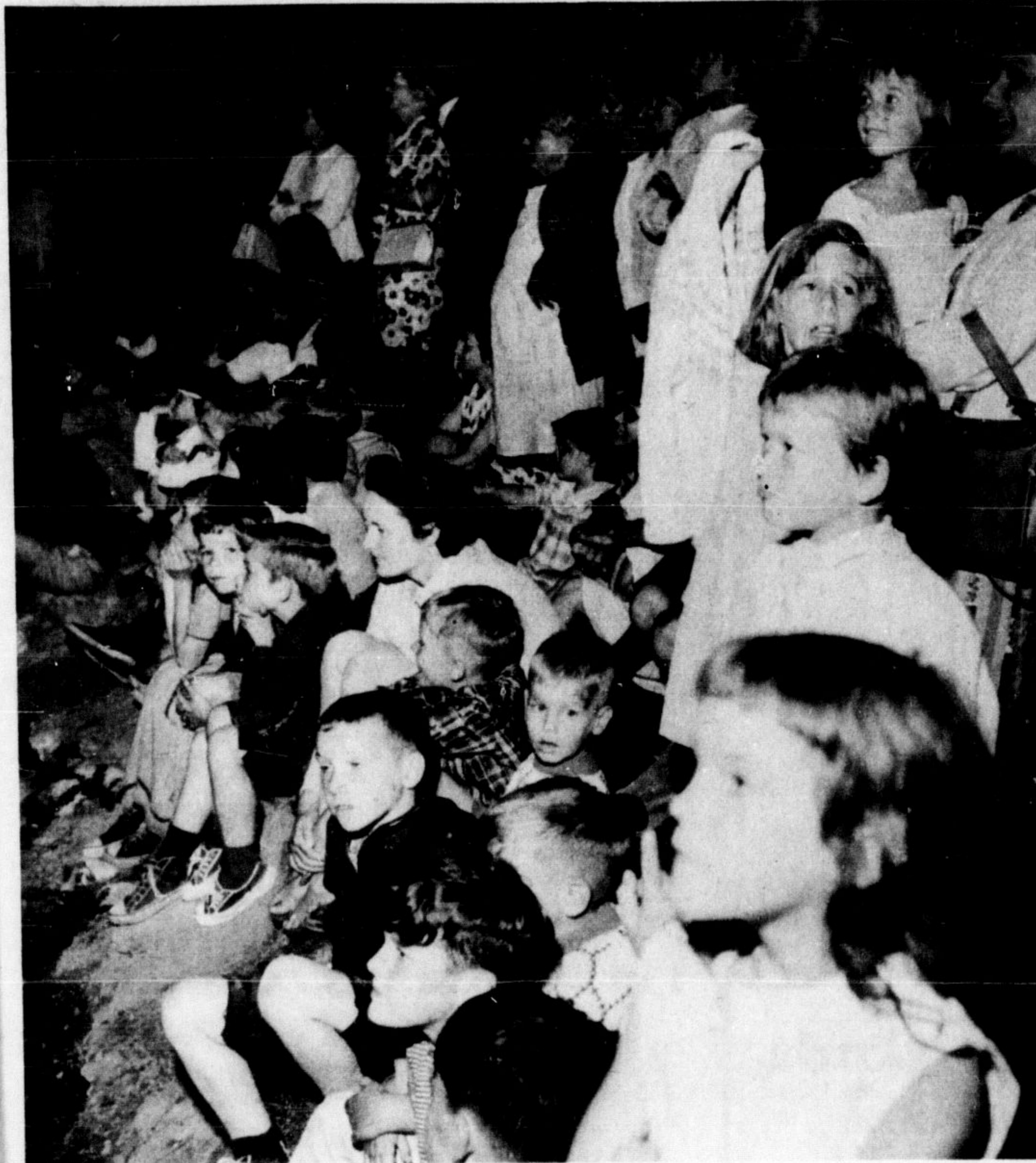

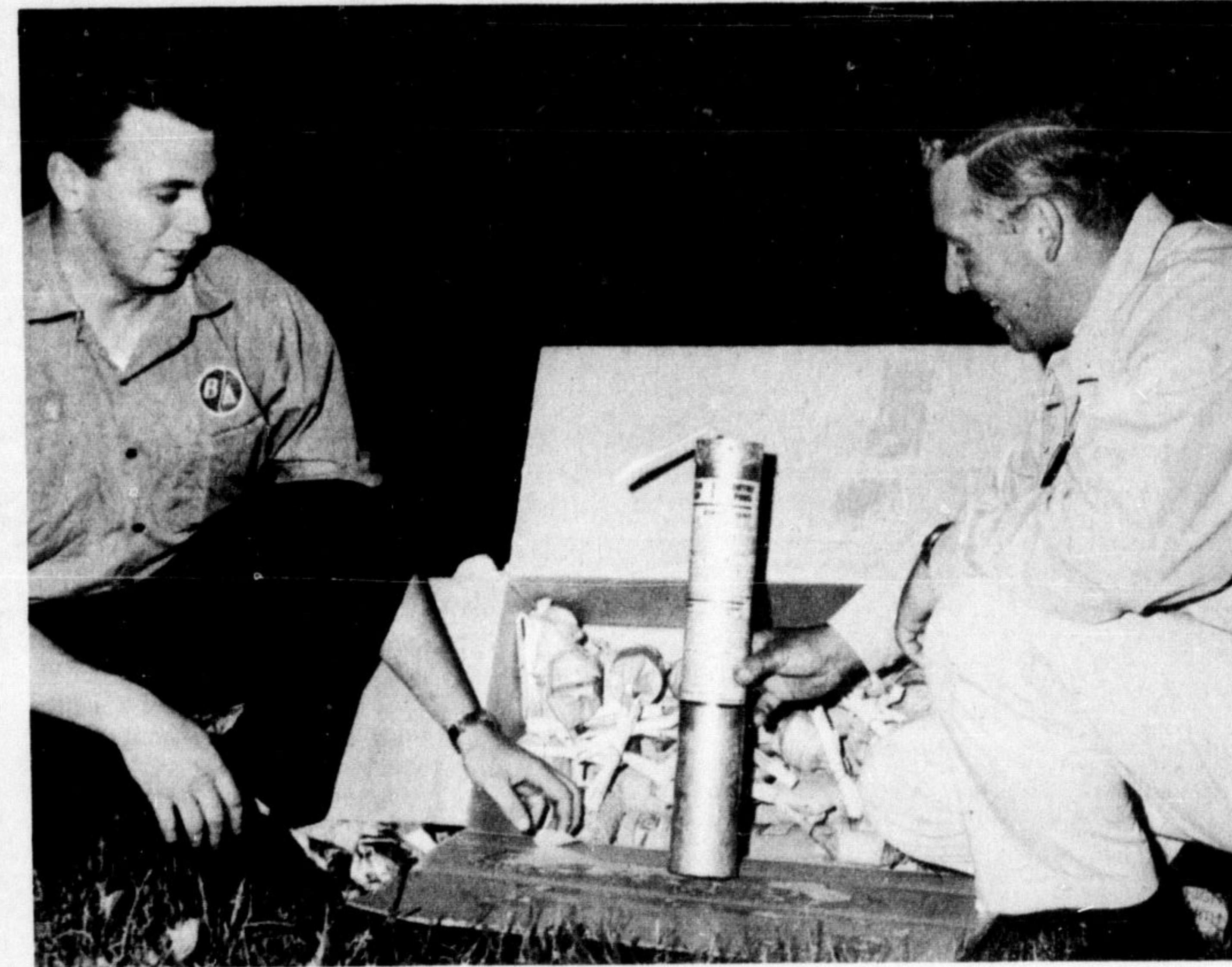

Discuss subdivision for Campbellville area

Representatives of the Ontario Water Resources Commission and Nassagaweya Council discussed plans for a proposed subdivision in Campbellville at a special meeting Thursday afternoon.

A.B. Reddykopp, supervisor of waterworks and G. Mills, District Engineer for O.W.R.C. discussed with council the best way to provide water for the subdivision. The subdivision firms have

approached council for the contract. The preliminary plans show the subdivision will be located in Campbellville, south of 401 Highway, and will be large enough for 16 homes.

The representatives advised council to have the subdividers take care of the water and sewage arrangements. Usually it is done this way and the municipality takes over ownership of the system when the last home is built.
