--Received correspondence from the Oakville Board of Education refusing to accept responsibility of getting North Oakville public school students to Milton schools, as requested in a letter sent to Milton P.S.B. by Mrs. B. Brown of Base Line Rd. and forwarded to Oakville.

-- Read the reply from Ontario School for the Deaf superintendent D. Kennedy, whom the board had written concerning a mutual pooling of some facilities of both parties following a request from O.S.D. for use of certain classrooms in Bruce St. Public School. Mr. Kennedy favored the exchanging of equipment and in-

cluded a long list of items that could be made available to public school students.

-- Approved the hiring of Mrs. Anne Chuchmach as secretary to principals of J. M. Denyes and Martin St. Senior Public Schools. She will also assist with the administrative duties of the Board.

--Learned there have been 12 windows broken and eight cracked by vandals at the Bruce St. Public School.

--Approved the purchase of two new clocks for J. M. Denyes Public School.

--Decided to proceed with plans for an organized parking lot at Martin St. Sr. Public School including the re-routing of some vehicular traffic. Board Member Murray Hood will research statistics and design the lot, which will provide parking for an additional 30 to 40 vehicles.

-- Agreed to donate to any service club, organization or charity who ship supplies to underprivileged foreigners, a number of text books of no further use to the board.

Two companies merge Meter Plant is involved

John W. Ostler President of Canadian Meter Plant told the Champion Thursday, Canadian Meter Company of Milton had been involved in a merger between General Precision Equipment Corporation, (its parent company) and the Singer Company. Both the share holders of Singer and of GPE met at separate meetings July 11 and approved the merger. A definite merger agreement was subsequently approved and signed by the Boards of Directors of the

companies May 9. Singer is a leading worldwide manufacturer and distributor of household and industrial sewing machines, business equipment, textile machinery, heating and air conditioning equipment and laboratory test instruments. It had sales in excess of \$1.3 billion in 1967 and earnings of \$50.1 million.

GPE designs, manufactures and markets technologically advanced systems and equipment for government military and space programs. In addition, it supplies a wide variety of control and metering devices for industrial and consumer usage and products for the educational field. Its sales were in excess of \$461 million in 1967 and its earnings were \$18.7 million.

Under the merger agreement, five officials of GPE became Directors of Singer, the surviving company. They are: William G. Hamilton, Jr., formerly Chairman and Director of GPE and President of American Meter Lloyd L. Kelly, formerly Executive Vice President and Director of GPE and President of General Precision Systems, Inc.; James W.




