BURLINGTON—The possibility of city status still looms over the town, and council is having a special meeting next week to discuss a suggestion to opt out of Halton County and become a city. A preliminary report prepared by the town treasurer showed it would cost Burlington \$180,000 (1.12 mills) or more to operate as a city. However, Burlington feels it has a \$700,000 equity in Halton County's assets and if this were paid back over a five-year period it might help wipe out the extra costs of going city-status.
