Cameron carries away prizes in fair's Guernsey classes

The Guernsey herd of J. H. Cameron again carried away the lion's share of the awards in the Guernsey classes at Milton Fair on the weekend.

Cameron won the premier exhibitor and premier breeder banners, and won the breeder's herd class besides showing the grand and senior champion cow, the reserve junior and reserve grand champion bull, and the best uddered cow in the show.

Seven exhibitors made a total of 60 entries in the annual Halton and Peel Guernsey Show. Andy Telfer of Paris was the judge.

Others exhibiting were William G. Booth of Milton, J. M. McCullough of Acton, John Y. McNabb of Georgetown, H. L. Pickering and L. S. Pickering of Oakville, and Reg Black of Brampton.

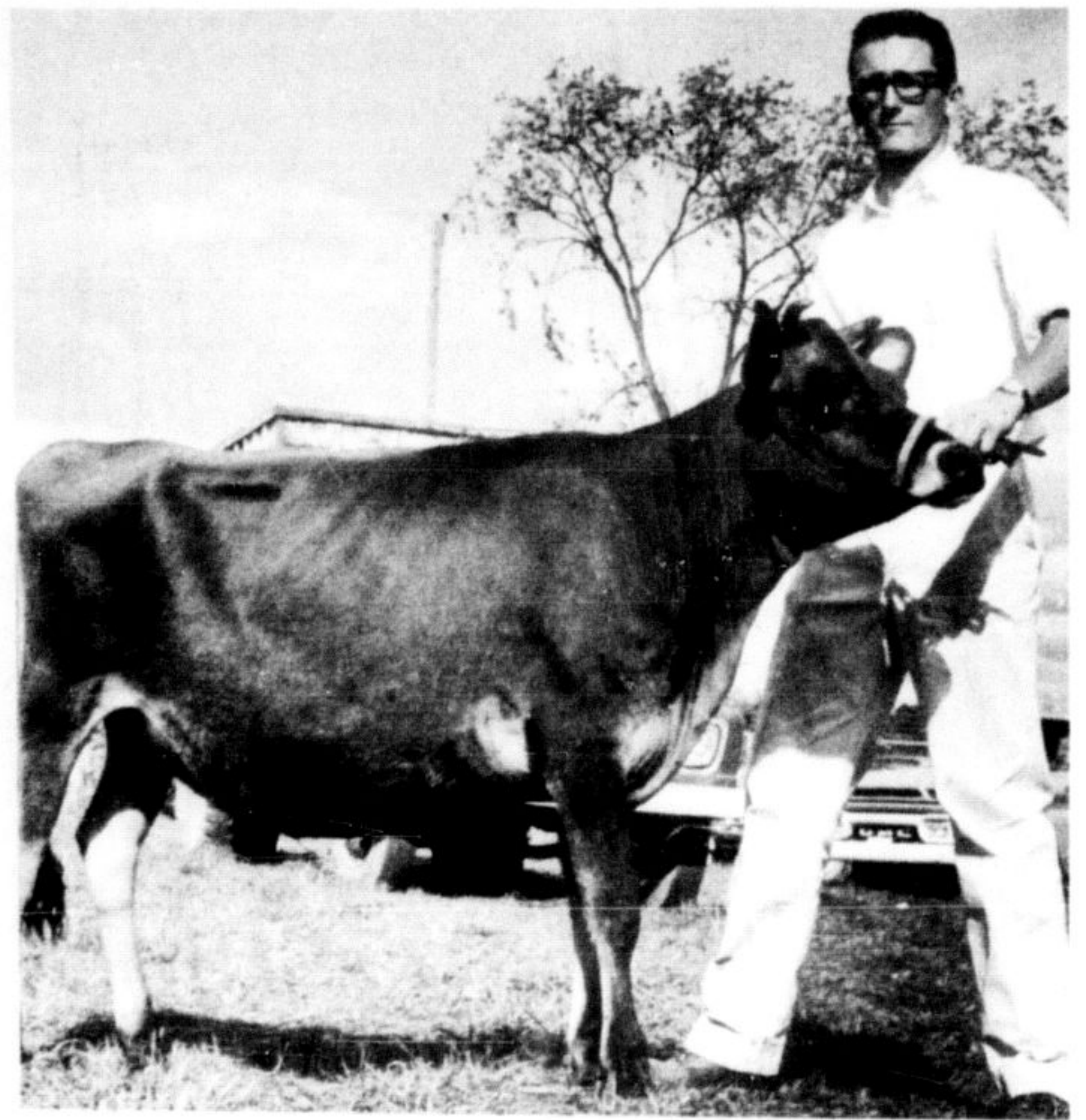

His hobby orchard dominates fruit classes at Milton fall fair

With the exception of one class, J. Harry Horning of R.R. 3 Burlington won all 24 of the fruit class competitions at Milton Fair.

T. J. Brownridge, R.R. 2, Georgetown, won the class for white grapes but Mr. Horning won the 16 classes for varieties of apples, three in pears, one in plums and three in grapes.

Mr. Horning, a perennial winner in the fair's fruit classes, is often the only exhibitor. "We didn't come last year and they only had one bunch of grapes entered," said his wife. "We felt we let the fair down."

Hundreds of fair exhibitors agreed when they saw last year's empty table which is usually, thanks to the Hornings, piled high with delicious fruit. But they were back this year with 48 entries out of 49 in the fruit classes.

The Hornings regularly display at Ancaster, Waterdown, Rockton and Milton Fairs. Fruit is just a retirement hobby for the couple. Born on a fruit farm near Waterdown, he was a collegiate principal in Toronto, retiring to the farm in 1947 when he planted a large orchard. It keeps him busy but it also allows time for travelling holidays and the Hornings are planning a trip to visit their family in B. C. this winter. Two years ago they took a round-the-world cruise which both really enjoyed.
