Ella's Jersey cow best udder in show Jerseys continue to dominate the Milton Fair's annual competition for the best uddered cow in the show. For the third year in a row, a Jersey topped the contest as Mervia's Climax Sandra, a six-year-old Jersey in the herd of Kenneth Ella and Son, Hornby

defeated eight other entries in the 1968 competition at Saturday's Sandra was shown by Lorne Ella. Four judges inspected the animals and scored them independently of each other. An official

The contest always produces a lot of friendly rivalry between owners of the various breeds. It was instituted at the suggestion of former Canadian Minister of Agriculture Harry Hays of Calgary, and is becoming a popular feature at many Canadian fall fairs.




