Oaks, Milton boards meet on rezoning

Milton and Oakville planning boards got together Thursday to discuss a Milton request for rezoning of 120 acres of northern Oakville lands, but the discussions resolved little.

Instead, the secretaries of the two boards were asked to put their heads together and come up with a recommendation. Their report will go to both boards for further discussion at some future date.

Milton sought to have the Oakville group rezoned lands for half a concession east of the Third Line. The property abuts the Oakville land Milton will annex on January 1 and presently carries an M1 industrial zone, which Milton wanted to have changed to agricultural zoning to act as a "buffer" or "holding" zone.

The local board is considering residential development of the lands west of the Third Line when the town expands next year, and preferred open or agricultural lands on the other side of the Third Line rather than heavy industrial uses.

Oakville planners retaliated with the suggestion Milton should also have a buffer zone on their side of the Third Line boundary.

Halton MP Rud L. Whiting reports from Ottawa.



The inner workings of the Canada Department of Labour were explained to some Members of Parliament, including myself, this week when the Hon. Bryce Mackay took us on a guided tour of his department.

This tour was the first in a series and based principally on how information is gathered and distributed.

The Public Relations and Information Services Branch, including its distribution centre, was explained in detail. The tour visited the media relations section, which handles all press releases and statements; the general information section where pamphlets and booklets explaining branch and departmental programmes are written; the audio-visual and promotion section which handles the National Industrial Relations Film Library as well as film clips, posters and all types of advertising; and the publications section which writes and compiles the English and French editions of the Labour Gazette.

The Labour Gazette produces some four million pieces of literature a year. It is also actively engaged in a film programme dealing with the many problems affecting employees and employers due to technological change. This programme, exploring the social and economical challenges of such change is part of a wider departmental programme of how to introduce change without undue hardship for the individual.

We are all aware that change is inevitable but it is the department's concern that any major changes in the work situation only take place after prior discussion with the people involved so that equitable solutions can be found.

The tour also visited the department's library, considered one of the top five labor libraries in North America. Not only does the library have some 80,000 books dealing with all aspects of industrial relations, it also has an exceptionally large periodical section containing labour relations journals from all over the world.

Several members, asking how they would find comparative information on labor statistics, were told that the library staff would research the requested information as well as offer individual studying facilities for any member wishing to research on his own.

Later in the tour a film exploring the problems facing both union and management in a collective bargaining situation was shown. This film is one of several hundred which will soon be available in quantity to those
