laws; and the notorious "38 Red Tape Steps" affecting a raw piece of land before any action can be taken to develop it.

The situation as it should be. according to the report, would have approximately 75 per cent of families in their own home-which means homes must be made available with relative ease to those earning \$5,000 per annum-without resorting to apartments or owner-maintained collective housing which will be the ghettos of poverty and unrest in future years.

First on the list for intense assistance are the special cases, including lower income families, aged people, the disabled and so forth. Subsidy rather than public housing is suggested. Land prices must also be held in check.

The government's role, the Halton committee suggested, is to remember since Canada is on the democratic free enterprise system, and government enterprise can seldom be operated more profitably than private ventures, all that is required of the federal authorities is to provide guidance, law, research and some limited financing.

Adequate tax revenue to maintain the country is, of course, required, and if the government intends to ease the pain by reductions in income or sales taxation, the deficit must be made up elsewhere.

Possible government courses of action, therefore, would include: establishment of revolving capital expenditures funds from which towns could draw to provide trunk sewers, the fund to be reimbursed through taxation of developers; formation of large tracts of land provision of services and auctioning of lots from it; heavy taxation of speculators' capital gains to discourage them in what would become an unprofitable

provincial and municipal governments to iron out problems in the education portion of land tax; co-ordination of a research program winto building materials and methods; creation of self-sufficient satellite cities; mandatory acceptance of the National Building Code through withholding of N.H.A. funds from non-participating municipalities; creation or encouragement of private creation of a savings and loan institution and coincidental introduction of a variable tax rate, new mortgage and land title techniques and other benefits to cut red tape; escalation of establishment of regional government and regional planning and necessary transportation links; longer periods for N.H.A. mortgages, but with negotiable interest rates each five years; standardization of municipal service requirements (one would assume it rains twice as hard in Mississauga as in Burlington, according to storm sewer requirements presently in effect); reservation of a percentage of lots in approved subdivisions to avoid ghettoing; and encouragement of companies building homes for their own employees with a price ceiling and certain tax exemptions.
