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

Trails for snowmobiles

Halton Region Conservation Authority is considering a proposal to build snowmobile trails either in and around the Kelso Conservation Area, or overland from Kelso to

Rattlesnake Point. Neighboring landowner Davie Menzies suggested to the Authority he would be willing to co-operate with trails over his land near Kelso. A committee will study the proposal.

At last week's meeting the Authority also:

* Decided to investigate the formation of a conservation foundation, similar to Metro Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's foundation. Members said if a foundation was established, any grants or donations might benefit Authority programs.

* Agreed to sell a home in Scotia, taking over the post today as former manager William Oakville back to the original owners, at a loss of \$8,000. The G. Bosada home was needed for the Morrison-Wedgewood Creek diversion channel work and the Authority bought it last year for \$30,500. The home was not damaged during the construction work and the owners applied to repurchase it. Members approved the sale at \$22,500, with an added clause that the Authority would not be responsible for damage claims as a result of the channel.

* Heard a report from the public relations committee that the Authority's display had gone over well with crowds at the International Plowing Match near Guelph, where it formed part of the Halton County tent display. The display was also shown at the recent biennial conference of conservation authorities.

* Invited members of the Halton Sportsmen's Association to serve on the Authority's land use committee for the mutual benefit of both groups.

* Learned the temporary dam committee seemed to be Drumquin Park needs rebuilding and decided to discuss the project with Oakville Board of Parks Management.
