

Wants burnt school for home council refuses, too near road

Nassagaweya council last week refused an application from H. Jacquemart to renovate a burnt out school house on the Fifth Line in Nassagaweya because of the building's proximity to the road. If the Township follows its plan to widen that road it would bring the building to within two feet of the road allowance. Reeve William Coulter suggested, "That is not a healthy situation for any home."

Mr. Jacquemart told council it was his intention to use the existing walls and foundation and to build a house valued at \$20,000 and put the house up for sale. He said he had an agreement with a carpenter that he would finance the property valued at \$6,200 and the carpenter would build the home at no charge. Later they would

sell the home and split the profit.

Council suggested Mr. Jacquemart would be better to demolish the existing structure and move the building back to comply with the Township's By-Law. S. W. Savage, Building Inspector for the township told council the Health Department had forbidden him to issue a building permit for the proposed plan.

Four-way stop Hornby corner

Motorists travelling through the intersection in Hornby at the

Seventh Line and Base Line Road will be required to obey four-way stop signs soon, Halton county roads engineer Jack Corbett said.

Up until now Base Line Road has been a through street and motorists were not required to stop. Mr. Corbett showed some concern for motorists who travel the road often and are accustomed to passing the intersection without stopping.

After what Mr. Corbett described as a four to six month education period, Trafalgar Road (the former Seventh Line) will be made a through road and Base Line Road will become a stop street.

He said the two and a quarter mile road diversion valued at \$390,000 was originally scheduled to open in June but the contractors are well ahead of schedule and the road is expected to be opened this week.

Armstrong Bros. of Brampton handled the job and ran into difficulty with wet weather up until August, then picked up lost time in recent good weather.

Trails for snowmobiles

Halton Region Conservation Authority is considering a proposal to build snowmobile trails either in and around the Kelso Conservation Area, or overland from Kelso to Rattlesnake Point.

Neighboring landowner Dave Menzies suggested to the Authority he would be willing to co-operate with trails over his land near Kelso. A committee will study the proposal.

At last week's meeting the Authority also:

* Decided to investigate the formation of a conservation foundation, similar to Metro Toronto and Region Conservation Authority's foundation. Members said if a foundation was established, any grants or donations might benefit Authority programs.

* Agreed to sell a home in Oakville back to the original owners, at a loss of \$8,000. The G. Bosada home was needed for the Morrison-Wedgewood Creek diversion channel work and the Authority bought it last year for \$30,500. The home was not damaged during the construction work and the owners applied to repurchase it. Members approved the sale at \$22,500, with an added clause that the Authority would not be responsible for damage claims as a result of the channel.

* Heard a report from the public relations committee that the Authority's display had gone over well with crowds at the International Plowing Match near Guelph, where it formed part of the Halton County tent display. The display was also shown at the recent biennial conference of conservation authorities.

* Invited members of the Halton Sportsmen's Association to serve on the Authority's land use committee for the mutual benefit of both groups.

* Learned the temporary dam in Drumquinn Park needs rebuilding and decided to discuss the project with Oakville Board of Parks Management.

Considering merger of parks, recreation

Members of Milton's Parks Board and Recreation Committee met with council Monday to debate the proposed merger of the two boards. It was generally agreed a merger would produce more efficiency in operations, especially in areas like the community swimming pool where responsibilities of the two boards overlap, and few objections were voiced.

In some communities the parks and recreation facilities are managed by the same people serving as two boards, it was pointed out. Acton, Brampton and several western Ontario towns operate this way. Some even merged their arena boards with parks and recreation bodies, and the arena manager also serves as recreation director for the town.

This brought a comment from Councillor Colin Smillie that the arena board has been working very well as a separate entity for many years, and shouldn't be touched. "If there are untouchable areas in town, the Parks Board would like to be considered one of them," replied Mr. Dills.

As the discussion ended Mr. Gervais said the recreation committee would favor a single board, and Mr. Dills said the parks group would consider it further and submit a letter containing pros and cons for a merger.
