i) less any horizontal area of the lot which before filling or grading is covered by water or marsh, or is below the discernible rim of the bank of a river, watercourse or lake or where the slope of the land is greater than 3.5 feet in 10 feet and the vertical distance is 20 feet or more; and

ii) less any horizontal area of the lot which does not lie within a zone in which the proposed use is permitted."

2. By deleting clause (b) of subsection 19 of section 1 and substituting therefor:

"(b) 'lot coverage' means the total horizontal area of that part of the lot area occupied by the ground floor of all buildings on the lot."

3. By deleting subsection (4) of section 10 and substituting the following therefor:

"(4) as passing through the front and rear lot lines of a lot and thereby dividing that lot into two residential zones and the lot cannot, along such boundary, be divided into two or more lots which comply with this by-law, the lot shall be deemed to be in the zone in which the greater part of it lies."

4. By adding to section 10 a new subsection (5) as follows:

"(5) as separating a Conservation (04) Zone from another zone, the boundary is 100 feet from the centre of the watercourse or river, the top of the bank or the highest known flood limit as established by an Ontario Land Surveyor, whichever distance from the centre of the stream is the greatest."

5. In section 33, by adding to the column headed "Maximum Units Per Acre" the words "of Lot Area" so that it shall read: "Maximum Units Per Acre of Lot Area."

EXPLANATORY NOTE BY-LAW NO. 1968-127

This by-law introduces a new definition for "lot area" and relates to lots which abut lakes, rivers and watercourses. It also introduces a new definition for "lot coverage." It will provide a more accurate method of establishing a zone boundary for a residential property where the zone boundary passes through the front and rear lot lines. It introduces a new method for calculating a zone boundary, indicating the method of establishing the limits of the Conservation (04) Zone.

TB Assoc. plans early

A well-known Halton association has a new name.

At a meeting in June of the board of directors of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association, a decision was made to change the name of the association to the Halton County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association. This was to conform with a country-wide move to include respiratory diseases within the activity of the Association.

With the fortunate decline in recent years of the incidence of TB due to better control methods, it has been made possible for the Association to expand its activities to include the respiratory diseases associated with the chest. This is particularly notable in the case of emphysema, which takes a considerable toll of human life each year.

The expanded program taken on by the TB and RD Associations has put an added burden on the volunteer workers as well as the staff, as well as an added burden on the finances, which are obtained by public donations.

The annual Christmas Seal Campaign that accounts for the funds that the Association works with is about to be kicked off again this year. It is being started earlier this year due to the upcoming increase in postal rates.

As in past years a group of 150 students under the direction of Principal H. A. Brearley of Thomas A. Blakelock High School, will fill the envelopes with seals for mailing, on Saturday, October 26. This year the envelopes will be a new special mailer that is a self-return envelope. It is simpler for mailing and simpler for the donation to be returned.

Do-it-yourself sod turning at Sheridan Oakville site

Sheridan College will hold a "do-it-yourself" sod-turning ceremony at its new Oakville campus site on Monday, Nov. 4 at 2 p.m.

Bulldozers and/or backhoes from the heavy equipment school at Milton, an affiliate of this Halton-Peel community college, will probably be driven by a hard-hatted Bill Davis, Minister of Education for the province of Ontario, or J. A. Turner, chairman of the Sheridan board of governors, or both, during the ceremony.

The event takes place at the 102-acre site on Trafalgar Rd., immediately north of Queen Elizabeth Way, south of Upper Middle Rd. in Oakville.

The Hon. William Davis was expected to officiate at the ceremony, but college officials were awaiting his return from Scotland before receiving confirmation of his attendance. Sheridan President John M. Porter will speak.

Members of the college's board of governors, presidents of community colleges in Ontario, principals of Halton-Peel secondary schools, school board officials, mayors and reeves of municipalities, representatives from the college's consulting architect, and other dignitaries have been invited to participate.

The Sheridan Student Senate, comprising 25 members, will represent students' interest at the sod-turning.

The ceremony will signal the start of the \$3,000,000 Visual Arts Building's construction, as Phase 1A of a four-year program that will see the completion of a five-building radially designed college destined to hold 5,000 students.

Visual Arts students, presently housed in one of the college's campuses at Brampton, are expected to occupy the new building by September of 1969.

Current budget restrictions are not expected to interfere with Sheridan's development, as financial commitments have already been made by the provincial government.

Refreshments will be served at the site.

During the week of Oct. 20 to 26 inclusive officers of Milton Detachment, O.P.P. investigated 32 general occurrences. Included were four prowler complaints, one of which was unfounded; one malicious damage; one missing person complaint which was also unfounded; one investigation under the Liquor-Licence Act; one theft; one impaired driver was apprehended; and a motor vehicle which was involved in a hit and run accident in Milton was apprehended by a patrolling officer. Three premises were found insecure.

A "stake-out" at a cache of found property led to the arrest of three persons and the recovery of stolen property valued at approximately \$400. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.

Nineteen accidents were investigated during this period, five of which were personal injury accidents only. Total property damage was estimated at \$9,420.

Prov. Const. T. R. Penrice, Safety Officer, gave safety talks to two classes at Pineview School, with 61 pupils in attendance. In these two classes Const. Penrice again stressed school bus safety, and distributed literature on this subject.

All children have a right to live, and we all have a duty to see that they do. See to it on Hallowe'en night, won't you?
