

Principal explains new method of reporting progress to parents

The general monthly meeting of the Kilbride Home and School Association was held last Monday evening with 140 parents and teachers attending. Dr. R. Muirhead presided and extended a warm welcome to all attending, then read the Home and School Creed and announced that there will be no meeting in November, as parent and teacher interviews will be held during the month. The next executive meeting will be held Monday, Nov. 18, in the staff room.

Principal Norman Howell held a discussion on the new method of reporting to parents.

The report you receive will be based on your child's progress as an individual and not as compared to other children in his class. The emphasis will be on closer and better communication between the school and the parents through parent-teacher interviews and the reporting will be related more closely to the actual skills of the instructional program.

Marks have been deleted from the kindergarten to grade 6 reports since it is impossible to measure the progress of children's learning on a hundred-point scale. The assignment of marks using numbers gives an impression of accuracy and objectivity that is misleading to teachers, parents and children alike.

New reports will be introduced in grades 2 to 6 to coincide with the reports introduced last year in kindergarten and grade 1.

Kindergarten parent-teacher interviews will be held in November and report cards will be sent home in March and June. These reports will be retained by the parents. Other interviews will be held as required.

For units 1 to 12, grades 5 and 6, interviews will be held in November after the first report has been sent to parents. Reports will be issued in March and June, to be retained by parents. Other interviews will be held as required.

Mr. Howell was given a vote of thanks by Mr. Ambeault. Mrs. Carolyn Rogers' grades 4-5 won the shield and award for the most parents in attendance.

Following the meeting the parents visited the classrooms of their children to meet the teachers.
