GETS ACTION AND ANSWERS

Our appeal last week for support on the Brown-Main traffic light got a lot of response, as usual. One man called to join our campaign—just one.

"You ought to watch the children crossing that street at noon hour on a Friday," said our caller. "It's horrible—it's just one of those things you hate to watch." He feels if council won't go for a full traffic light at that corner, they should at least be prepared to subsidize a crossing guard or a police constable to direct the traffic and allow the school children to cross in safety. There are a lot of children from the Main, Mill, James and Victoria Sts. area using that corner daily to get to the Denyes school.

Okay, we'll back off on the traffic light request. Now how about a crossing guard?

Rabies is prevalent in animals in this area, and everyone should be alert to any warning signs that your farm animal or pet has been stricken with the disease.

Cows will bawl incessantly, some animals will froth at the mouth, and wild animals will invade farmyards and residential areas once they become sick. The best thing to remember is, if an animal appears to be acting strangely you should stay away from it, avoid any physical contact whatsoever, and call a veterinarian.

A change in traffic procedures will take place this week at the intersection of Base Line and Trafalgar Road (formerly Oakville's Seventh Line).

The new Hornby diversion road which curves north-west from this corner will open this week and the county is introducing a four-way stop at the busy corner. The four-way stop will be in force for several months and eventually the Trafalgar Road will become a through road and Base Line traffic will have to stop.

We know how busy this intersection is with traffic, and we worry. Already readers who have seen the signs being installed have asked The Champion to campaign for some form of LIGHTED stop signs or advance warnings to alert motorists to what lies ahead.

Leaf bonfires not only provide a nuisance to neighbors (who may not appreciate being smoked out of their homes)—they constitute a danger to motorists whose view may be blocked by a whiff of smoke.

A reader telephoned Safety Corner Monday and suggested if people insist on burning their leaves, they should do so at the rear of their yard and not near the street. A bonfire attracts children and in the words of the reader, "one child's life is worth more than all the leaves in the world."
