### If Your Car Ran on Money You Might Be Losing Cash

If your car's engine ran on money instead of gasoline, chances are you'd be throwing away up to 50 cents every tankful.

Based on findings of a recent test program conducted by Champion Spark Plug Company, the average motorist is wasting about a gallon and a half of gasoline per tankful.

The tests measured gasoline consumption before and after tune-up. Using a unique portable dynamometer manufactured by Laboratory Equipment Corp., Mooresville, Indiana, the Champion program also probed the effects of tuneup on power and passing performance.

According to George M. Galster, Manager of Champion's Automotive Technical Services Department, "One unfortunate fact is that the motorist doesn't realize his car's performance and economy is suffering. In fact, when asked before tune-up how his car is running, he usually answers 'Okay.' "

Galster mentioned that 60 percent of all U.S. cars are in need of tune-up at any given

The typical U.S. driver's indifference to engine maintenance was shown in a recent Champion survey on why motorists neglect tune-up. Major reasons for neglect were: 1) they think they don't need it; 2) they are concerned about the cost; and 3) they find it inconvenient.

Galster remarked, "I feel these attitudes stem from the motorist's not being aware of tune-up benefits. For example, nearly 60 percent failed to




