Milton's sixth victory features rugged play

After dropping their second game of the season Friday night in Lindsay, Milton Merchants won the second game of the series against Lindsay here Sunday afternoon.

Milton lost to Lindsay 2-1 in a heart breaker and won their home game 5-3. "We played our best hockey of the season for two and a half periods, and then slacked off a little," Coach Stu Hannant commented after Sunday's game.

Merchants cashed in twice on the weak Lindsay defence, scoring two goals on rebounds. Barry Elliot opened the scoring for the home club, picking up Rick Cole's rebound. Graham Hern, who later received a match penalty, assisted on the first goal.

A pass play from Don Hearn to Gary Naylor accounted for the second goal and gave Milton a 2-0 lead going into the second period.

Defenseman Ken Parton engaged in fisticuffs with Lindsay's Jeff Stuart and although neither player was seriously hurt, Parton would have to be given the full 10 points for his bout. The scuffle broke out in front

of the Milton net at the end of the first period and saw Parton take a secure position on top of the Lindsay player.

Milton's Graham Hern did battle with Russ Stephens in the second period after both players were assessed two minutes each for roughing. A wrong word from one or the other sparked a brief but vigorous scuffle with Hern ending up on top, near the penalty box.

A long leader pass from Steve Lawrence to Rick Cole at the Milton blue line set the stage for the Milton captain's only goal of the game.

Cole took the pass, broke fast and outskated the Lindsay defence to beat the goalie on a clean cut play perfectly executed.
