

Milton trounces Lindsay 9-1 Rick Cole scores four goals

Milton Merchants moved into a three point lead over second place Lindsay in Suburban Junior C Hockey action here Friday night, with a resounding 9-1 win over Lindsay.

Captain Rick Cole paced the Merchant attack with four goals and an assist. According to Merchant statistician Al Brody, Cole tied a record set three years ago by Craig Brush for the number of shots on net in any one game. Both players fired 10 shots.

Steve Basteed, a new recruit to the team had an impressive debut, scoring the first goal of the game on a power play from Graham Hern.

Cole scored twice after Basteed's goal in the first period to lead Lindsay 3-1.

Gord Grieder scored Lindsay's only goal.

Tom Gooding, Don Hearn, Don Chuchmach and Graham Hern had singles in the second while Cole added two more goals to make his four goal total for the night. Cole scored on an

average of 40 per cent of his shots.

Both teams were held scoreless in the third and final period. Milton outshot Lindsay 51-29 for the game and generally outthrusted them.

The Merchants put forth their best team effort of the year and were backed by solid goaltending by Lloyd Vaughan when the pressure was on.

Tom Gooding played one of his better games of the year. Gooding marched in on Lindsay goalie Bryan Davidson on a clean cut breakaway and failed to score. But he managed to get the puck out in front to Rick Cole while the goalie was still out of position in the first period, and then scored himself with the Merchants shorthanded in the second period.

The 9-1 victory startled fans a little as most were expecting a closer contest. The clubs have been within a couple of points of each other since the beginning of the season.

Milton will meet them in

Lindsay Thursday and Georgetown here Friday. The local club will be looking for a

good concrete hold on the league lead when they meet the two clubs this week.

Daughter of Milton couple on plane hijacked in U.S.

Mrs. Barbara Chenowith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Donatelli of Milton was aboard the DC-8 jetliner that was hijacked Thursday en route from Philadelphia to Miami and forced to fly to Cuba.

A Negro man identified as T. Washington on the passenger list sent a note to the pilot that read "Dear Captain, this flight is going to Havana. I have a gun and nitroglycerin. I've studied chemistry."

The hijacker won the sympathy of some of the passengers and the stewardesses when he left the plane in Havana.

He told them the whole affair was his mother-in-law's fault. "She is taking everything away from me," he said.

A small girl was with the man and he claimed he did it for her sake—to get her out of the country and because of the hatred and prejudice.

Mrs. Chenowith who was raised in Pittsburg and now lives in Miami is going on her 11th year as a stewardess with Eastern Airlines and told a United Press

International reporter she couldn't hold her tears back when the man left the plane.

The crew and passengers were returned to Miami Thursday night without the hijacker and the little girl. The hijacker was the 21st this year.

Mr. Donatelli first heard about his daughter's experience at about 5 p.m. when he heard of the hijack on the radio. "I knew the flight she took" he said. About an hour later he received a call from his son-in-law in Miami telling him what he had already known.

Ordinarily Mrs. Chenowith would have come to Toronto airport and be picked up by her father and spend the weekend here in Milton.

Her visit will be delayed until the middle of January but that is a small price to pay, compared to what may have happened, he feels.

Mrs. Chenowith told Mrs. Donatelli in a telephone conversation Friday she had worried about it until they landed but then she knew everything would be okay.

recommendation to use the Caradian Imperial Bank of Commerce was based on the fact they had more branches than any other. No bank had branches in all municipalities, he reported.

The committee on organization and appointments was directed to report and recommend a salary schedule for the senior officials. No indication of salaries was indicated when the senior appointments were announced.

To insure a smooth transition at the first of the year from the present boards to the new county board, the director was authorized to supply necessary classroom supplies where present stocks were not sufficient.

The Board also indicated, on recommendation of the director, it would permit purchases of current supplies of up to \$2 a student in elementary schools, \$3 a pupil in senior public schools and \$5 a pupil in high schools. These were indicated as

approximately 25 per cent of the annual budget for such supplies.

The director was also authorized "to take such action as is necessary to maintain the schools in efficient daily operation after January 1, 1969, on the understanding that any action, so taken will be reported to the next subsequent meeting of the Board."

School board in Milton, Georgetown, Acton, Nassagaweya, Esquesing and Oakville were named as Continuing Committees to fulfill the business and related requirements that are to be detailed in a plan prepared by the Director. The Committees will be phased out of operation prior to June 30.

It was noted there was no point naming such a committee in Burlington because all members, with one exception, had been elected to the County Board. Members of the continuing committee who are acting will be paid at a rate

similar to that previously in effect.

The Board's salary negotiating committee will be headed by W. B. Edwards with members L. D. Wood, W. A. Lawson, L. Pease, E. R. Sovereign, E. Bodner, and W. J. Priestner. The committee will make up the elementary and secondary panels and consist of three speaking and three observing members for negotiations. Mr. Bodner is on the elementary panel only and Mr. Priestner on the secondary panel only.

Chairman F. Armitage predicted the committee would be the board's hardest working. It was noted the variety of fringe benefits in effect around the county would have to be studied and the committee would also have to study ISOC recommendations on negotiations before meeting staff negotiators.

Trustees Priestner, Wood and Bodner were named to determine the balance of membership desirable on the Advisory Vocational Committee. It was suggested a 12 man committee would be appointed including six trustees, three representatives of employees and three of employers. The committee is expected to be formed at the second meeting in January and members were asked to present names by that time.

Accommodation for the board's senior staff is expected to be located in Oakville. The Director reported a preliminary survey indicates there is sufficient floor space both rented and owned in the present operating boards.

The Board adopted his recommendation that he have the facilities examined and a plan evolved to allow its efficient use. No changes involving financial obligations were to be undertaken without board approval.

Regular meetings of the Board were set for the second and fourth Thursday of each month with the next meeting planned for January 9 at 7.30 p.m.

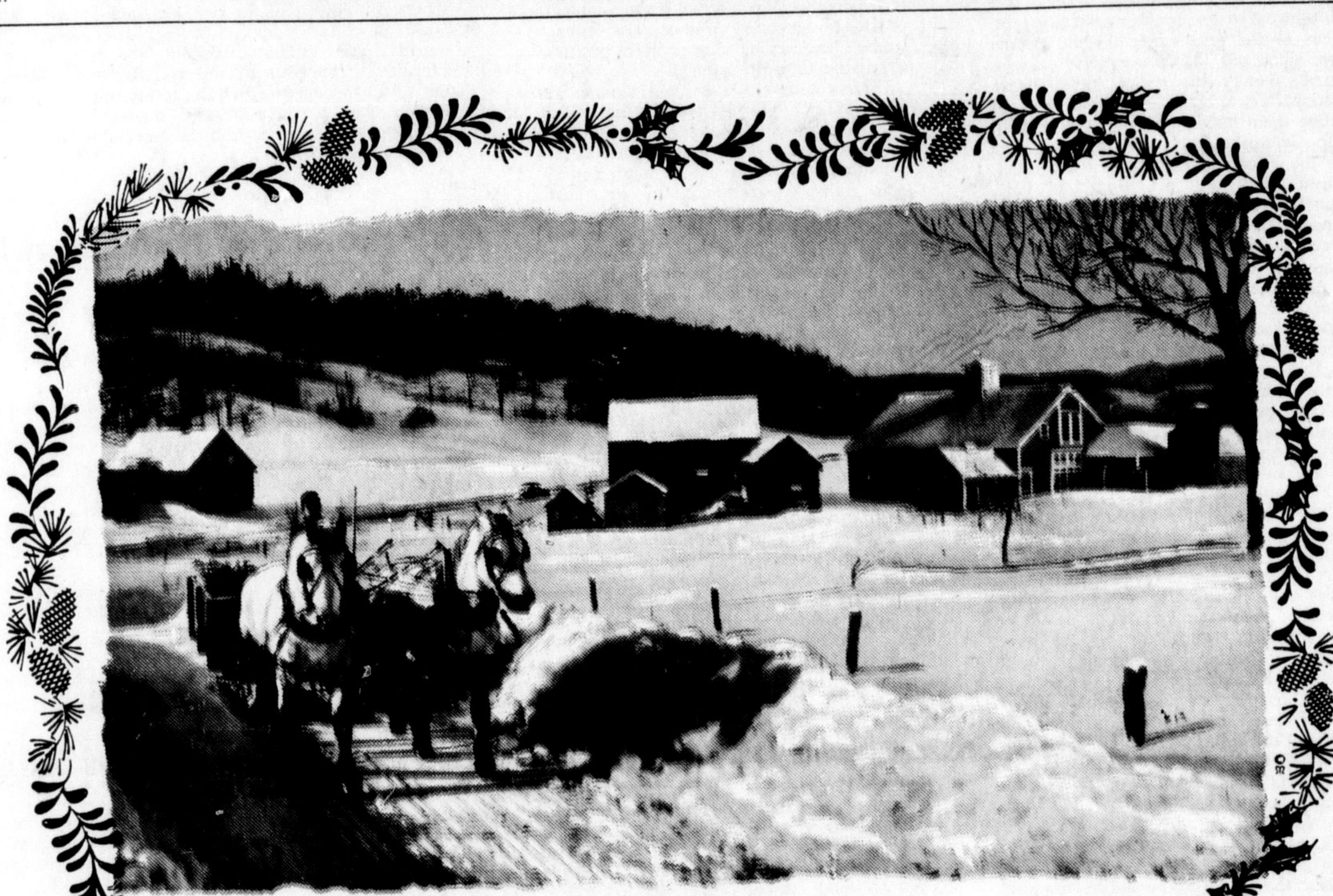
