Canada's first Christmas observed by Jacques Cartier

Canada's first Christmas celebration was back in 1536 when Jacques Cartier wintered at Stadacona with his ill-fated little colony. But that gallant bar.d of venturers had very little to celebrate-famine, illness, hostile Indians- winter itself combined to make that Christmas anything but merry.

The first Christmas worthy of the description "merry" was in 1606 in the colony of Port Royal. Plagued by scurvy and with another long winter upon them, the Port Royal colonists were struggling against extinction when Samuel de Champlain enlisted the art of gastronomony in the interests of good physical and mental health.

Champlain formed a dining club, "L'Ordre du Bon Temps." Each member took turn in being Grand Master for a day and it became a point of honor to fill the post of providing meals for the company with flair.

As a result of this friendly competition of the table, Marc Lescarbot, one of the earliest historians of Canadian settlement records that the "board groaned beneath all the


