## Halton field worker at CNIB workshop

W. K. Lawson, District Field Secretary for the Halton County Advisory Board of the CNIB, was one of 22 field secretaries across Ontario to attend a special workshop at the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Toronto. In a three day session that dealt with almost every aspect of CNIB service, the district representatives discussed recent developments in the program of rehabilitation for some 8,000 blind Ontarians. They took their notes in Braille or with the tape recorder.

They learned about new courses now being planned for the blind at the A. V. Weir Training Centre, recently opened in Toronto. With properly planned facilities and modern testing equipment, assessment of the newly blind will channel employable people towards a greater variety of careers. Trial runs on job possibilities formerly outside the range of blind workers will be made. Sheet metal and the construction of electric motors will be among the first new fields to be studied.

The men heard about progress in the Eye Bank of Canada which restored vision for more than 1,000 citizens in the last decade, and other prevention of blindness services are now reducing the blindness barrier considerably. Some members of the group discovered that the accident that swept away their sight several years ago would not cause blindness today because of a break-through in scientific advances.

They reviewed the three glaucoma surveys in which CNIB had a part during the past year. The tests disclosed to hundreds

of unsuspecting citizens that they had a disease that would cause blindness but they learned the fact in the early stages with plenty of time to arrest its development. A high point in the workshop was the talk by A. N. Magill, CNIB Managing Director.

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## Even in regional government

# Says sewer size sufficient

Week-old proposals for regional government reflecting an enlarged Milton area will not alter current plans on the sizing of a trunk sewer, Milton Council agreed in a committee of the whole meeting Monday.

The first stage of the major trunk sewer is currently under construction and provides for a 42 inch sewer from the treatment plant to Oak St. Mayor B. Best questioned engineer Ken Hyde on whether council should consider any increase in the proposed 42 inch sewer.

The engineer pointed out the sewer, designed to eventually reach to Highway 401, was planned to begin at 42 inches at the treatment plant funneling down to 36, 33, 27 and 18 inches.

Mr. Hyde rationalized that the upper reaches, not yet under contract, should perhaps be restudied, but the 42 inch section under contract was adequate. He pointed out it is almost double the original design capacity and would be equivalent to the flow of a population of 84,000. In the regional government proposal there is approximately 34,000 acres above the Base Line. At 10 person per acre this would show a possible population of 340,000 but this would be ridiculous in 50 years.

He concluded the 42 inch sewer was "more than adequate in size to take care of the town's needs for the foreseeable future." The engineer also foresaw no problems in current watermain extension proposals in the light

of the regional government proposals.

Council agreed not to undertake a feasibility study on relocating the Highway 25, now through the town, to the Third Line. A feasibility study is being prepared on rerouting of Highway 25 up Ontario St. and on an angle to intercept the present highway south of the CNR underpass on Martin St. extended above the Base Line.

The engineer told Council the Third Line proposal had been mentioned to Department of Highways officials but they indicated such a proposal was not in their plans for the foreseeable future. He suggested a study, estimated at \$1,000, would not alter their position and they would not subsidize the study.

Following a request from Peter K. McWilliams for the town to forego performance and maintenance bonds on his nine lot subdivision, members decided they would consider the procedure if the cash to pay for the completed services was deposited with the town. Installation of the services for the project is estimated at \$17,000.

The engineer reviewed to council the difference between a contractor's bond and the performance bond required of a subdivider. He proposed the suggestion that the subdivider post with the municipality the cash to insure completion of the roads, sewers, and watermain as required in the subdivider's agreement.

A strong feeling that each municipality should be represented on the regional government committee to meet with the Minister of Municipal Affairs was voiced by councillors. The Minister called for a three-man committee to be appointed by each of the two counties involved, to meet with him and review the tentative proposal he advanced last week. Members expressed disagreement with the Minister calling for the committee from county council. A motion was to be prepared for consideration next week after County Council deals with the matter at a Tuesday meeting.

Milton Hydro will be requested to move a pole from the designated lane from Montgomery Lane back of Main St. businesses. A property owner has requested the town to move the present lane to its proper location at the back of the business properties.

The engineer was advised to proceed on plans for a sidewalk on one side of Williams Ave. which would be set back in line with catch basin indentions in the curbing. The three feet set back would be asphalted and then a five foot sidewalk built. Estimated cost of the sidewalk is \$8,500 and of the asphalt \$1,800. When plans are completed it is expected a local improvement proposal will be advanced.

# N. Pearce chairs planners

Norman S. Pearce was returned as chairman of Milton Planning Board, with Don Hayward back as vice-chairman for 1969, when the board held its January meeting Thursday.

Mr. Hayward and secretary E. R. Pearen were named the

board's delegates to the Halton Planning Committee.

A budget totalling \$8,845 was proposed for 1969, with salaries at \$6,500 and consulting and legal fees at \$1,000 the two major items in the estimates. Postage, advertising, office

supplies, telephone, travelling and miscellaneous expenses were totalled at \$1,345.

The board had a surplus of \$1,833 in 1968, mainly due to lower than expected legal and consulting fees. The board requisitioned council for \$7,011.74.

British American Oil and Star Steel Company wrote the board to object to being classed as M1 areas in the new zoning by-law. The board advised both firms the by-law is a temporary "holding" by-law and will only be in effect until the town's new zoning by-law is approved.
