They may call an advisory meeting only to ask for advice but not necessarily need to accept it. The annual vestry votes and rules on major decisions of the church. The chairman of the Advisory Board for the year is Craig Royce. Canon Maxwell's two appointees are Ross Norton and Dick Course.

It was moved and seconded that they accept the church mission target for 1969 of \$610. Canon Maxwell asked that they consider reducing the mission grant a little each year. The Guild offered to help the sidesmen with this project and also requested and received permission to install a hot water heater and a more convenient entrance to the kitchen with necessary lighting and sidewalk.

The motion was passed that the rector's stipend be reviewed due to the rise in cost of living. Frank Chisholm on behalf of the congregation thanked Canon Maxwell, the wardens, the advisory board, secretary-treasurer and each and every individual and organization who had helped to make the year 1968 a successful one. The meeting adjourned and Canon Maxwell closed with prayer. Lunch was served by the ladies.

Nassagaweya couple mark golden wedding

Friends and family filled the farm home of long-time Nassagaweya residents Mr. and Mrs. Jack Milne on Sunday, when the couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Mr. Milne, a former Nassagaweya councillor and warden of Halton County, took over his family's farm on lot 29, on the first commission of the township.

Attractive yellow and gold anniversary flower arrangements, many cards and gifts surrounded them and all their callers during the day. A three-tiered wedding cake was specially decorated for the occasion.

Mr. and Mrs. Milne were married in Toronto on February 3, 1919, by the Rev. Logan Geggie, and lived there for a short while after. They moved back to the family farm after Mr. Milne's father became ill and retired to Rockwood.

The former Alva Hamilton, Mrs. Milne was born in Rockwood and spent her girlhood in the district. Mr. Milne was born in Saginaw, Michigan, moving with his parents to the farm in 1902.

In February of 1915 he joined the First Battalion, Canadian Infantry. Before many months

he was overseas, and he was wounded in Belgium in October of the samyear. A long period in hospital followed, and his parents went over to England at one time to visit him. He was invalided home finally, and got off the ship in Canada on Christmas Day of 1916, arriving in Toronto on New Year's Day. Wars were fought very differently then Mr. Milne recalls. In fact, when he was fighting in '15, the men generally wore their regular uniforms. Although there was mud "up to their necks" they had no rubber boots. And they were not even issued with helmets that early in the war. One of his brothers was killed overseas.

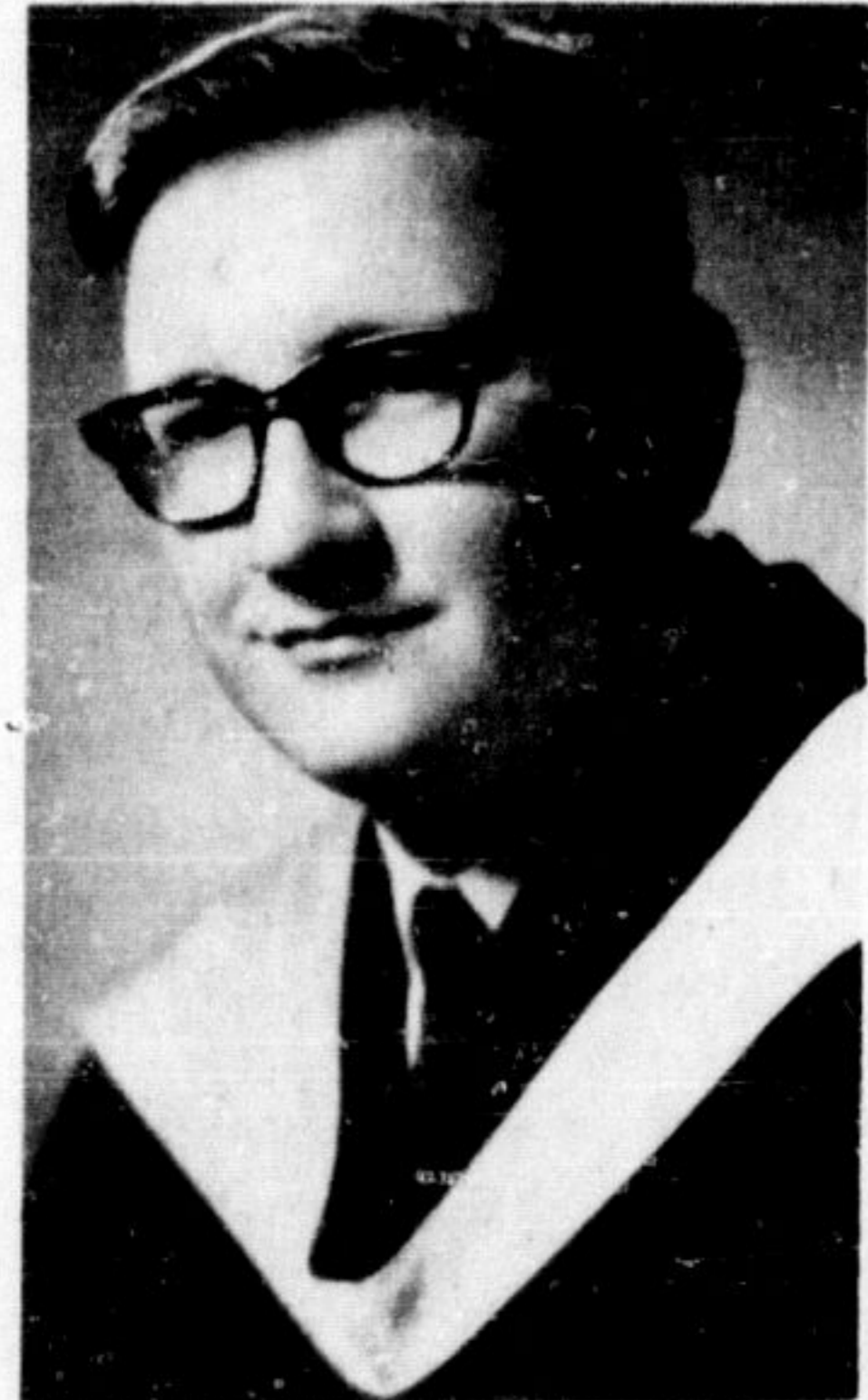
Mr. Milne has had a long record of service to the township. He was a member of Nassagaweya council for 11 years, from 1952 to the end of 1962. He was reeve for six years. In 1959 he was elected warden of Halton County.

The year he was warden, the Manor board was set up and he served on this board for five years, seeing the home at Milton become a reality.

He is still active, as Nassagaweya's representative on the Acton fire area board and on the county museum board.

They are members of Eden Mills Presbyterian church. The Milnes have one daughter, Mrs. Fred McNiven of Malton, a grandson and two granddaughters, and three great-grandsons.

Hikes penalty for absentees

A heavier penalty for absenteeism was placed on Milton Hydro Commissioners when Milton Council approved increases in honorariums Monday.

Council agreed to the proposed schedule of \$450 annually for the chairman and \$350 for commissioners, but required a \$30 deduction for each meeting missed. The Commission had proposed a \$10 deduction for missed meetings.

The Administration committee had proposed a \$20 deduction but was persuaded to raise it to the \$30. No per diem allowance is to be paid for meetings attended outside the municipality.

OK cash for bond

Milton Council has agreed to dispense with performance and maintenance bonds on the nine lot McWilliams subdivision, providing funds sufficient to cover the installation of services and engineering fees were deposited with the town.

Mr. McWilliams asked the town to dispense with the bonds, noting the contract price for work in the area did not include them. "It is after all a small contract and I doubt that there would be any problem which would arise as to performance or maintenance".

Two readings were given a by-law authorizing the signing of the subdividers' agreement on the nine lot area which also involves Ken Syer and R. Copley as part owners.

The third reading is proposed when the necessary funds are deposited.
