

North Halton clinic for fluoridating teeth

St. Paul's United Church Sunday school room in Milton becomes more than a place for religious education each Wednesday morning.

On that day throughout the year, and on additional days during the summer, it's the dental fluoride clinic for North Halton. Last year, nearly 4,000 children between the ages of three and 12 had the decay-arrestive compound applied to their teeth; and with the addition of five more schools, the figure could exceed 5,000

during 1969. There are 28 public and separate schools in the section of the County serviced by dental hygienist Mrs. M. Ludzik and her assistant, Mrs. H. Stroud.

This includes five in Burlington and three in Oakville, towns each having their own dental health services; but the eight out-of-area schools are left to North Halton due to their proximity.
