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Family Counselling Service handled 361 cases in 1968

A total of 361 cases were referred to the Halton County Family Counselling Service during 1968, an appreciable increase over 1967's 298, it was noted in the service's annual report for 1968 submitted to Halton County council by director R. J. Vivian.

Of these, 42 were in Milton, 151 were in Burlington, 82 were in Oakville, 57 were from Georgetown, 17 in Acton, nine in Nassagaweya and three in Esqueving.

There were 1,160 interviews conducted and 66 active cases still on record by Dec. 31.

The addition to the staff of one counsellor was approved by Council during 1968, and the Service is seeking the correct person to fill the position.

It's planned to have Burlington and Oakville services maintain a five-day-a-week staff, with full-time counsellor; while a second counsellor will divide his time between Milton and Georgetown servicing the northern communities.

Also on the agenda for 1968-69 are meetings with
