### 213 occurrences in busy January

Milton Police Force responded to a total of 213 occurrences during January, Chief Ray Andress reported recently.

This included 25 traffic accidents... 23 over \$100 damage and 11 under \$100 and one person injured. Total damage to vehicles was estimated at \$9,840.

The force discovered 16 insecure properties, issued warnings to 68 people, questioned 137 persons and served 91 summons and warrants.

A total of 64 persons were summonsed under the Highway Traffic Act and 143 parking violations were recorded.

Charges were laid for a variety of incidents including two for common assault, two for auto theft, six for other criminal code offences, seven for breach of liquor and provincial statutes, two for contravention of municipal by-laws, two for leaving the scene of an accident, and one dangerous driving.

Stolen property was evaluated at \$12,149.14; with \$6,612 being recovered.

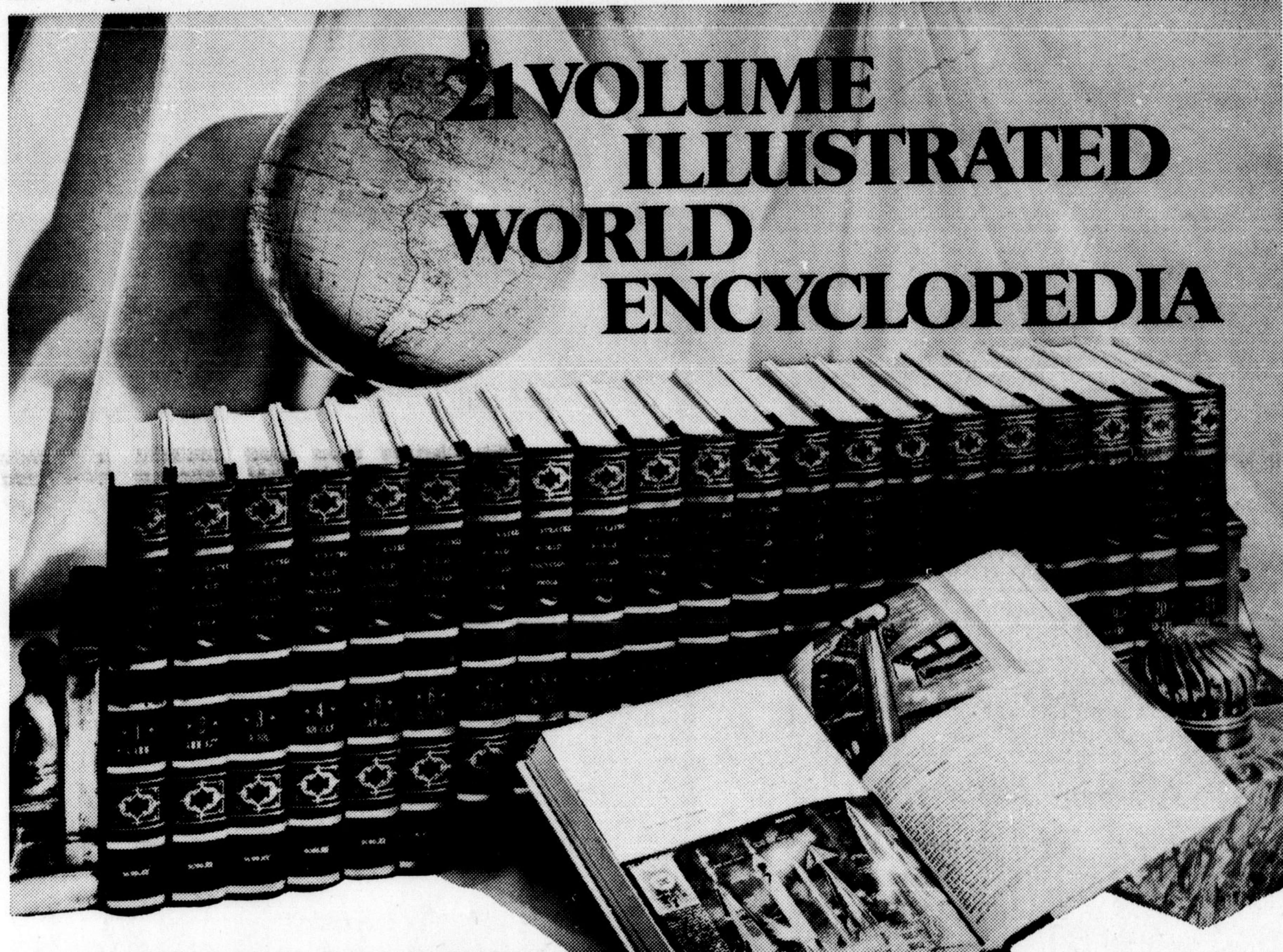

Panel of members lead discussions on growing plants

Milton and District Horticultural Society meeting was held in the Union Hall, Pine St., Feb. 17.

The president, Mrs. S. May welcomed everyone. The secretary, Mrs. W. Ford read the minutes of the last executive meeting and gave a report of the work done in 1968.

Addison Woodley reported on the bus trip to O'Keefe Centre, Feb. 26. Mrs. May read some of the coming events at the Botanical Gardens.

Mr. Kummer of Preston spoke of the horticultural work in Preston. On behalf of himself and Mrs. Lockie he presented Mrs. May with a handmade gavel with the initials M.H.S.

The program took the form of a panel discussion with the following members taking part, M. Readhead, Mrs. S. Lockie, Mrs. Cox, W. J. Thompson and Mr. Tinkler. Questions coming from the audience were read by Mrs. May and those on the panel answered.

Mr. Readhead spoke on roses and explained how to plant by digging out the earth and replacing with good loam. Roses don't like wet ground. He also told us that by spraying it is easier to kill insects under the leaves, than with powder.

Mrs. Lockie said it was best to clean Iris in the fall of the year.

She mentioned different sprays that could be used.

Mrs. Cox spoke on arrangements, explaining how to cut and condition the flowers for show.

Mr. Thompson said when growing plants under lights, 18 to 20 inches should be the distance that the lights are above the plants. Lights should be turned off after eight hours. Humidity plays a great part in a successful set up.

Mr. Tinkler took as his subject, annuals. He told us not to over fertilize plants, but leave them on the hungry side. Mrs. May thanked the panel for all the good advice given.
