

# Set \$31,318,000 capital budget

A \$31,318,000 five year capital budget for education was approved by the Halton County Board of Education last week. In submitting the budget Superintendent Bruce Lindley noted it was down from the capital budgets of previous

boards which were projected at \$38,172,500. The 1969 budget of capital projects includes the addition of a \$100,000 library resource centre at the Martin St. Senior Public School in Milton, for opening in 1970. The 1970

budget includes a library resource centre at the J. M. Deneyes School, Milton estimated at \$110,000. The budget envisions capital projects of \$8,773,000 in 1969; \$4,480,000 in 1970; \$5,270,000 in 1971; \$8,855,000 in 1972 and \$3,940,000 in 1973.

The allowance of \$400,000 for a school site was questioned by a trustee. Superintendent Bruce Lindley pointed out the site would have to be near the centre of Oakville and land was selling there for \$20,000 per acre. An area of 20 acres was required.

## For Indian library

### Book drive "mushrooms" set deadline for Friday

The book drive to equip a new library at the Oshweken Indian Reserve has been given a one-week extension, and good used books suitable for a public library will still be accepted locally until this Friday, March 7.

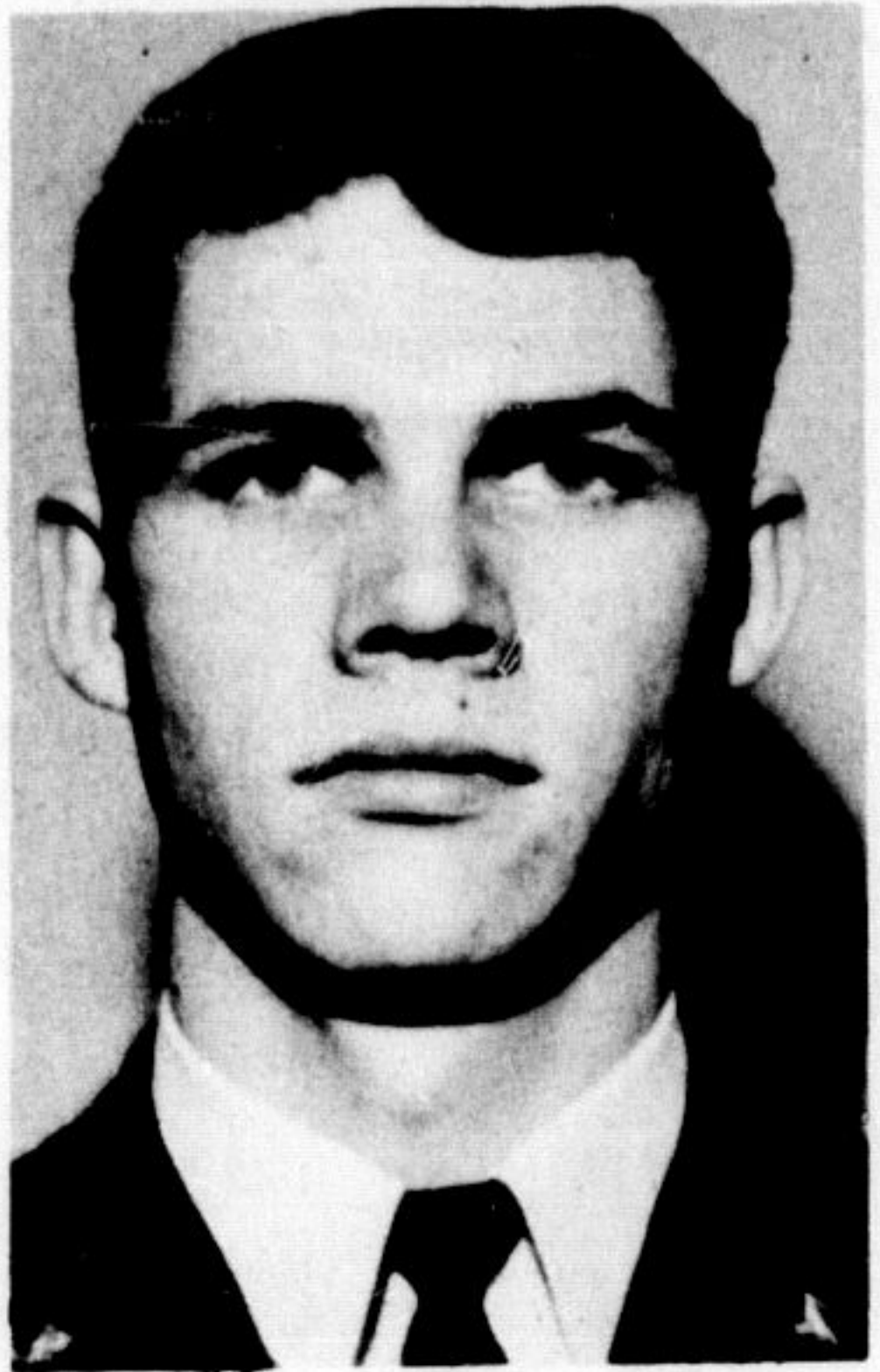
Mrs. W. A. Reeve, wife of Burlington's Deputy-Reeve and one of the ladies heading up the campaign in the Burlington and Milton areas, reports the book drive "really mushroomed" during the past week and as of Friday, there were 1,563 good books packed and ready for shipment to the Indian reserve. Unfortunately, only about one in three of the books collected was suitable for the purpose, owing to age, condition and subject content—but none of the books will be wasted. Those not heading for Oshweken will be

distributed to the Amity organization, Scouts, homes for senior citizens and hospitals throughout the district.

Mrs. G. Phinney of Burlington launched the book drive a few weeks ago when she heard about a newly-opened library at the Six Nations Reserve which had very few books. She enlisted the aid of Burlington councillors' wives to help fill the library shelves and the blitz is aiming for a total of around 4,000 volumes. Good novels, reference works and recent magazines are sought.

Local drop-off points are the homes of Mrs. W. A. Reeve, Mrs. A. Tufford, Mrs. Ken Young and the Milton office of E. B. Clements insurance. While the campaign was to have ended last Friday, a last-minute drive in Burlington schools has pushed the deadline back to this Friday. On Saturday the ladies have arranged for a truck to deliver the gifts to Oshweken.

# Promise higher budget for conservation in '69

Halton Region Conservation Authority spent a frustrating three hours Thursday evening trying to untangle the maze of aspects involved in their 1969 budget.

After a preliminary review, the Authority decided it was not possible to hold the budget to

the previous year's level. This is due largely to flood control programs especially requested by municipalities; and additional costs for the Hilton Falls and Scotch Block dam projects.

## Area superintendents L. McNeil, O. McDowell accept new positions

The work of the North Halton area's two former area superintendents has been phased out and their office in Milton has been officially closed as of the end of February.

W. Leonard McNeil, former area superintendent of the Halton No. Four, (Milton, Nassagaweya and Acton) has been appointed a Superintendent of Schools with the Ontario Department of Education, with responsibility for private secondary schools in the Grades 11 to 13 level. Orville G. McDowell, who was area superintendent in Halton No. One (Esquesing and Georgetown) has accepted a position as Program Consultant in Special Education with the Department, and is responsible now for Region 7 which includes Simcoe, Dufferin, Peel, Halton and three boroughs of Metro Toronto.

Both men plan to continue to live in Milton. They are both working out of a Department office at 40 Eglinton Ave. E., Toronto.

Mr. McNeil came to the Halton office as an inspector 10 years ago, and says he enjoyed every minute of his work in this area. He recalls the introduction of the new mathematics, continuous progress, and the equipping of every school in his area (with just one exception) with fine new library-resource centre facilities among the accomplishments in education during his tenure here.

He began his new work in mid-January and is working with

two other superintendents responsible for between 40 and 50 private schools and secondary Roman Catholic schools in the Hamilton-Toronto area. Mr. McNeil is a former high school teacher and although his work has been concentrated at the elementary school level for several years, he reports he enjoys getting back into secondary school education again.

Mr. McDowell has been with the Halton inspectorate for eight years. His work is mainly liaison and giving assistance where needed to individual teachers and administrators responsible for each county's special education projects—slow learners, perceptually handicapped, the gifted and children with brain damage. He began the new task on a part time basis last September and went into it full time on Jan. 20.

The new Halton County Board of Education has taken over the inspecting of all Halton schools and E. S. Lavender has been appointed co-ordinator of the North Halton area, working from an office in Georgetown.
