Campaign March 24

Red Cross goal \$1,500

Milton Red Cross, one of this community's smaller but most active organizations, is making its annual appeal for financial support from the citizens, and a blitz of local homes will be centred around Monday, March 24.

President Don Hayward said some canvassers will be out on the streets a few days prior to the blitz night, while others may have call-backs to complete after the main Monday evening blitz. The Red Cross is seeking helpers for the campaign and anyone with a spare evening to donate can contact him at 878-6790.

Red Cross officials point out that all funds collected from Milton are spent back in the community. Semi-annual blood donor clinics, disaster aid, a loan cupboard and safety are the major projects but as everywhere in the world, the Red Cross stands ready to help in any emergency. The two blood clinics, usually

held in January and June, are always successful and an average of 483 pints of blood are collected here each year. Because there is a local donor clinic, residents of Milton and district can obtain free blood transfusions. Ontario Red Cross frequently praises the local branch for the large clinic turnout.

Disaster aid is another important area of the work of Red Cross. Help is always available in cases of fire, flood or other distress. The branch operates a loan cupboard which includes wheel chairs and crutches, and hospital beds and walkers are also available. This year the organization is hoping to expand its loan cupboard facilities.

The Red Cross also works hand in hand with the Milton Community Swimming Pool staff, supplying water safety literatures and equipment, and conducting a water safety poster

contest each summer. A lifeguard chair and other equipment at the pool have been Red Cross donations.

This year's campaign goal is \$1,500. Mr. Hayward said. The Bank of Montreal will be the headquarters on blitz night.

Big crowds were reported at local schools' open houses last week, marking Education Week.

Hospital requests grant

Esquering council took no action on a request from the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital for a grant for a proposed \$1,780,000 expansion program.

The hospital has received O.H.S.C. approval for a 31 bed addition along with renovation and modernization of the existing buildings. In a letter to Esquering council, the hospital administrator cited the rapid growth of the area and the attendant pressures on the hospital for expansion plans.

Tenders, the hospital board hopes, will be called in the early summer for the project of which two-thirds or \$1,070,000 will be financed by the Ontario government and \$186,000 by the county, leaving \$524,000 to be raised.

The hospital board despaired of raising this amount in the two communities so requested a grant. They estimated 6,000 township residents used the hospital, a figure council considered exorbitant.

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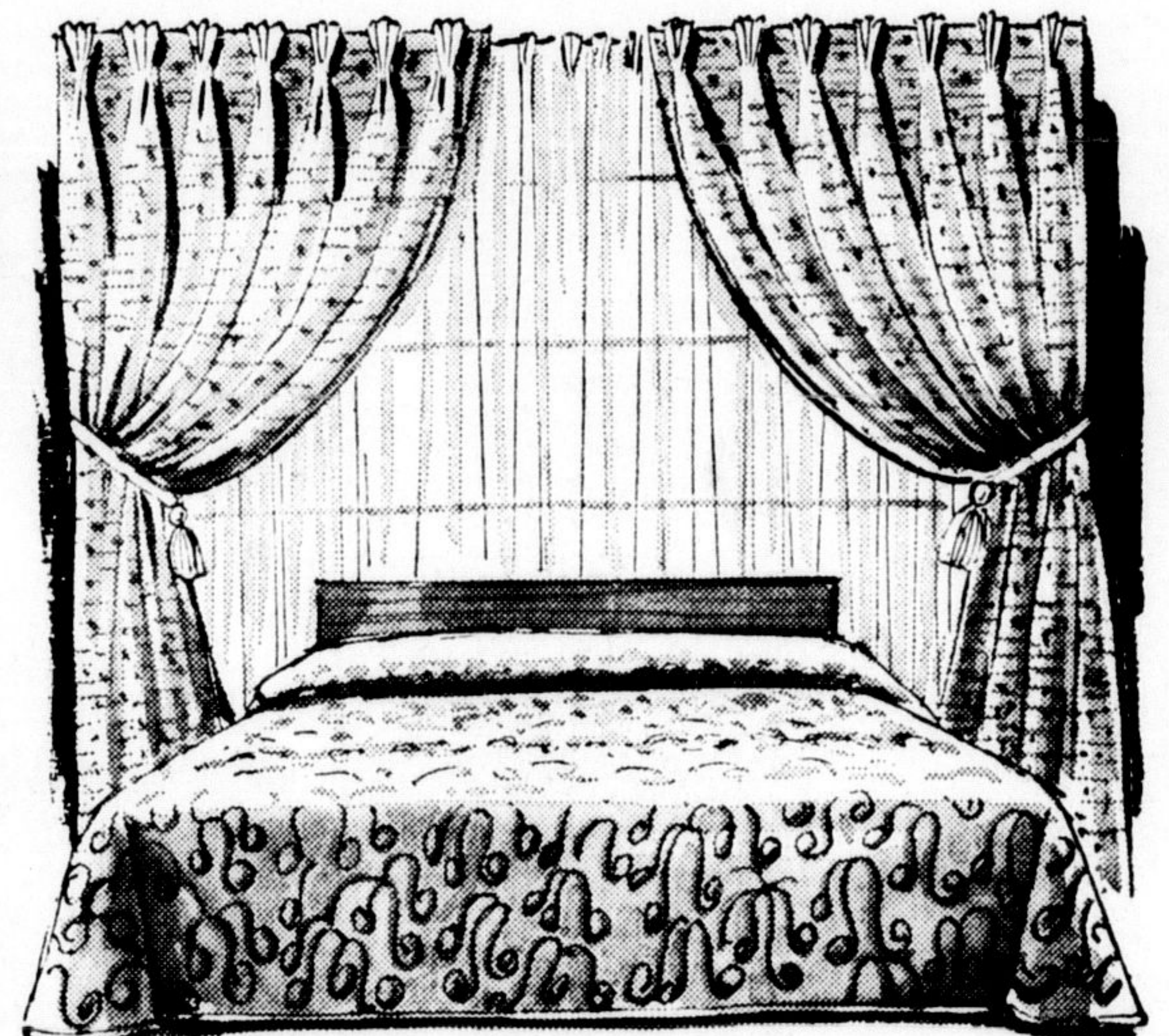
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
