**LOSE FINE BANDMASTER**

Georgetown, Ont., March 31, 1969.

To the Editor,

Dear Sir:

In the passing of Mr. Alfred H. Perrott of Brampton on March 28, 1969, in Toronto, the country has lost one of its ablest and finest bandmasters.

Those who knew him personally will mourn the passing of this gentleman, a friend who was kindly, unassuming, and helpful on every occasion.

As a musician and bandmaster, Alf as we affectionately called him, was a real virtuoso on the clarinet and one of the finest bandmasters on the continent. His teaching abilities helped many would-be musicians on the road to the mastery of their instruments.

His temperament in the sphere of music was always calm and unflustered and never bombastic. Except in special classes, he never singled out an individual who may have erred in rendition or technique, but rather took the group of instrumentalists to which the player belonged over the part which had been erroneously played.

Mr. Perrott had a long and

varied career in music in the army and outside.

Many awards won at the Canadian National Exhibition and other contest centers by bands under his leadership attest to his capabilities as an outstanding bandmaster and the calibre of musician he created.

Georgetown, Acton, Milton and Streetsville will remember his work with the Lorne Scots and Georgetown Citizens' Band and the Acton and Streetsville Band. His army associates will mourn the passing of this truly great man.

May the great symphony in Heaven be made up of such kindred spirits.
