## Urge budget review board to control education cost

The Halton East Progressive Conservative Association has urged the Ontario Government to establish a Budget Review Board "with powers to review, amend and control the budgets of District, County and Designated City Boards of Education."

In a brief submitted last week to the Hon. Charles McNaughton, Ontario Treasurer and the Hon. William Davis, Minister of Education, the Association suggests that such a Board should include experienced cost accountants who would be independent of the Boards of Education whose budget it would review. The budgets of all Boards of Education in the Province would be carefully scrutinized prior to approval.

"Such approval would be necessary before the Boards could receive funds from the municipalities", said John Kilmer, President of the Association.


The Association also urged the Ontario Government to

implement its plans, as announced recently by Mr. McNaughton, to increase education grants to cover 60 per cent of the costs of elementary and secondary education. At present Ontario pays approximately 45 per cent of these costs with the balance coming from property assessment within the jurisdiction of the local Boards of Education.

"One important function of such a Budget Review Board would be to insure that any savings effected by its review and the increased grants would be passed on to the property taxpayers", said Mr. Kilmer.

### Report for May Three hurt in town collisions

Three persons were injured in three personal injury car accidents in Milton during May, Milton Police report.

Apart from the three injuring crashes, there were eight collisions with more than \$100 property damage and six with less than \$100 damage.

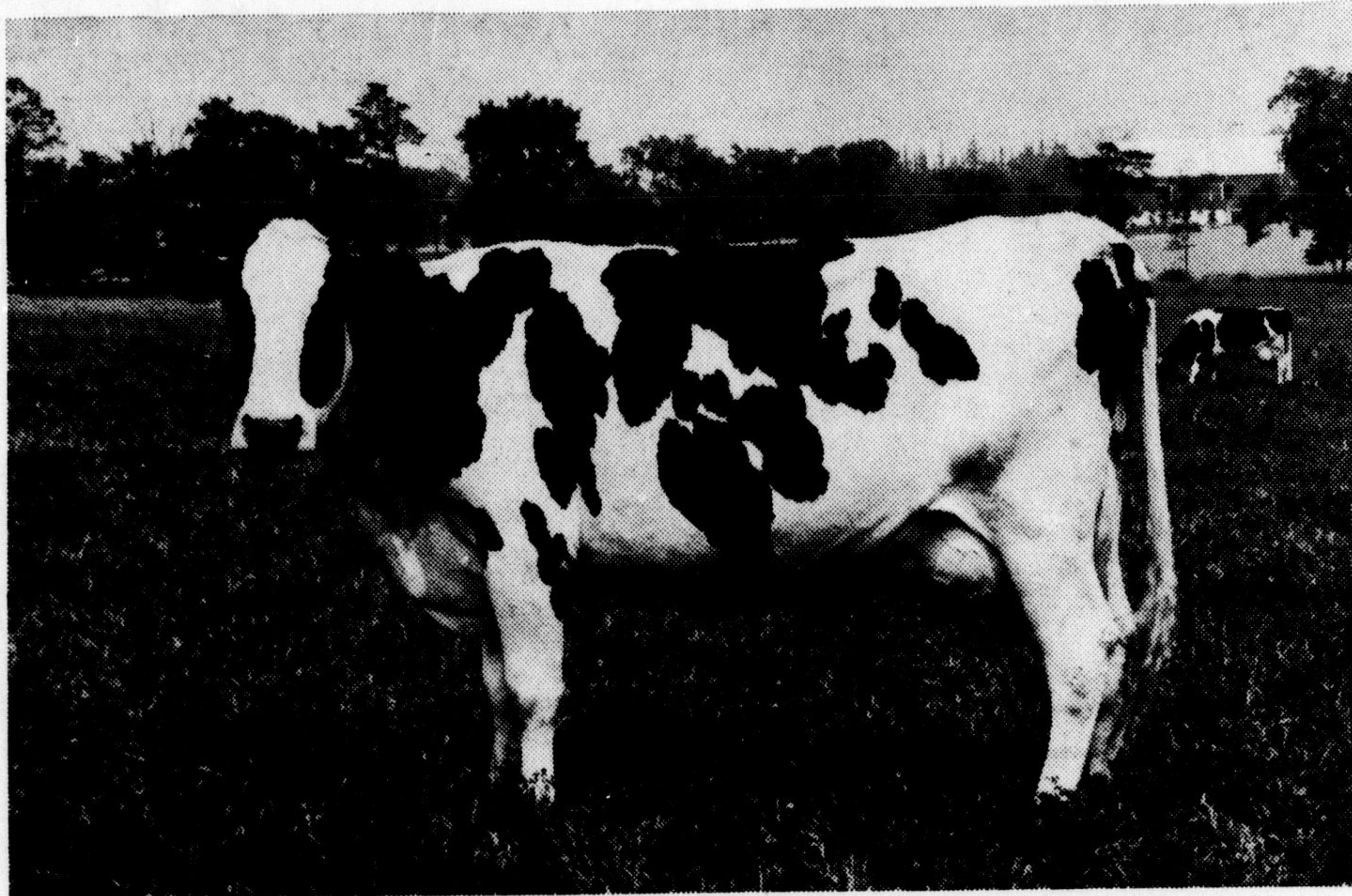
No fatalities were reported, but the 17 crashes caused a total of \$4,905 property damage.

Elsewhere in the force's 347 occurrences were 15 findings of

insecure property, 58 persons warned, 100 summons and warrants served and 182 persons questioned.

Liquor charges led the list with 11 laid, while three charges each of common assault and by-law infringements were made; and one charge each of sex offences, fraud, offensive weapon, dangerous driving and impaired driving.

Parking violations totalled 28 and 59 persons were summonsed



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
