

Second vocational school in Oakville board nixes central Milton location

The County's second special vocational school will be located in Oakville, members of the Board of Education decided Thursday, despite some suggestions that Milton area would be more central.

The special vocational school, scheduled for opening in 1972, will be like General Brock School now located in Burlington. Possible sites are to be presented to the next meeting of the Board.

Trustee W. Lawson observed that a school located in Oakville would make its services available to the whole county but not necessarily accessible. He questioned if the school should not be further north to be more central with the next school foreseen in 1976 or 1977 located in the area of growth.

Assistant Director D. S. Lawless reported growth in Georgetown and Milton based on municipal planning indications would not be great.

Trustee Lawson suggested the area that could be served from a more central location was not just that above the Base Line, but could include north Oakville and north Burlington.

Georgetown Trustee E. Bodner spoke in favor of the school being located in the Milton area to accommodate growth since the General Brock School is in the south west section of Burlington. He noted Georgetown was

negotiating with a large developer which could result in considerable growth in his community if agreement was reached.

Mr. Lawless acknowledged all these things had been considered but it would be in the late 1970's before any residential growth is allowed above highway 5,

Humphreys "unhappy" Milton getting well

Halton Region Conservation Authority chairman Barry Humphreys stated he was "very unhappy" over the decision granting Milton permission to sink a second well at Kelso Conservation Area.

Formal permission was given for the construction of the well during the full Authority meeting of June 4. Chairman Humphreys was unavoidably absent at the meeting, which was chaired by deputy-chairman William Sargent.

"I feel this matter should perhaps have been sent back to the Water Control advisory board for further consideration before making a decision," Mr. Humphreys declared. "I think the Authority acted in haste. When the two largest contributing municipalities (Burlington and Oakville) suggest a charge should be made for the use of the water, it should be worth considering." Mr. Sargent noted the decision was made following lengthy discussion, and a recorded vote had been taken. Only three

according to Burlington officials. "We do see an escalation of growth in the east (Oakville) area". He indicated there could be some difficulties in transportation but the school is operated on a shorter day for this reason.

The Board approved the Oakville location with Trustees Lawson and Bodner opposing.

O. P. P. REPORT

During the week of June 8 to 14 inclusive, officers of the O.P.P. attached to Milton Detachment worked a total of 1,028 hours and patrolled 10,568 miles of roads under their jurisdiction. Charges were laid against 70 persons for driving offences and 39 others received warnings. A total of 50 convictions were recorded during proceedings in Provincial Judges Court.

New truck for Hydro

The Milton Hydro Electric Commission has decided to purchase a new truck at a total cost of \$25,000, Hydro Commission secretary O. L. Hadley reports.

The new truck built by Smith Brothers will feature a corner-mounted boom with a basket and digger. Mr. Hadley said the digger will be a boon to his men since they had to dig all utility pole holes by hand.

Cab and chassis will cost \$5,700 while the digger and all extra equipment will cost \$19,000. The extra equipment includes a generator for providing emergency power.

"The other truck has served us five times over," said Mr. Hadley. The commission intends to use it as a back-up truck. They expect delivery of the new truck within six to eight weeks.

Flint film shown here

Record prices at auction as church contents sold

Record prices were paid Saturday at an unusual consignment auction sale at Ashgrove, when the congregation of Hillcrest United Church sold off the contents of the former Hornby and Ashgrove United Churches plus the lot on which the Ashgrove church had stood for many years.

An Ashgrove man paid \$10,400 for the lot which is just a little bigger than half an acre. There were five bidders.

The furnishings and contents of the two old churches, plus several items contributed by members of the congregation, brought a further \$1,740. The money realized from the sale of the lot will go to the building fund of the new Hillcrest church, while the remainder will be used to purchase furnishings and equipment for the new church.

Ward Brownridge, a member of Hillcrest, was auctioneer and he and Charles Austin headed up the committee in charge of Saturday's sale. Mr. Brownridge reported it was his best sale this year—high prices amazed everyone and everything except a flower stand and a hog crate were sold.
